GRANGERS HEAR ADDRESSES

SECOND ANNUAL EDUCATIONAL DAY A GREAT SUCCESS.

Many Speakers, Big Dinner and Receptions Make Fine Program.

The second biennial educational day meeting of the Blue Mountain Grange Saturday, October 15, 1910, will long be remembered as a grand step in the line of progress for which this Grange stands. Blue Mountain Grange not only stands, but works for the education and advancement of all the people.

When a gathering of people listen to the class of entertainment there given it is impossible for them to go away not being benefitted, being better for the hearing of it. There is only one sad fact connected with such good things and that is the deplorable one that they can not be heard by all and thus brought home to the hearts of all those most vitally interested. It is a privilege indeed, even an education within itself to listen to the kind of addresses that were given County School Supt. E. E. Bragg, Prof. Bailey of Elgin; Prof. W. L. Tucker, Island City; Prof. Conklin, of Cove; Prof. Olson, Union; and C. D. Huffman, W. M. of B. M. G., and the papers that were read by Prof. Stout, La Grande; Mrs. Redhead, Mrs. Golden, Mrs. W. R. Gekler, and Mrs. Fraker. The readings, songs and music were in a class by themselves which admits of no criticisms.

County School Supt. E. E. Bragg, in his address urged the closer acquaintance and co-working of parents and teachers, giving several illustrations that left no doubt as to the genuine benefit derived from such practice. He cites the fact that there is a law in many states against the practice of vivisection and implores the parents, if they must verbally vivisect the teacher not to do so in the presence of children as it detracts from their respect toward that teacher, consequently marring their good conduct in and about school. In a word it tends to demoralize that which they (the parents and the teachers) are most earnestly trying to build up and bring to the height of perfection, the good home and the good school.

Prof. Bailey's address "Surrounding Influences" will long be remembered by those who heard it, not for rhetorical perfection, sublime flight in oratory etc., although a goodly portion of these things were present in it, but for the heart interest, truth, genuineness of sympathy and facts that will stand test. When Prof. Bailey looking the audience in the face said, "Listen to me", then proceeded to outline, explain, defend or deplore facts and conditions in language, simple, plain, elegant, on account of the genuine feeling any sympathy, you felt and knew that he was right. He says, "Give the boy and girl on the farm what they go to the city to get, such as books, music, pleasant associations and education and you have solved the problem by keeping them on the farm and teaching them to love it instead of hating it as the slave hates his prison. I thank God for it. I have given my girls, as near as I can, the kind of a home I longed for, craved and left the farm for when a boy. I wanted books, I wanted music, I wanted education, but the old gentleman, God bless his soul, he was alright in many ways. He was a Quaker, said we couldn't afford books and music was only for girls and that a common school education was good enough." Mr. Bailey praised at length and in glowing word pictures the greatness of opportunity, advantages, grandeur and beauty of Grande Ronde Valley as compared with any other place he had ever seen and he has traveled many states in the United States. Concluding he gave an illustration of surrounding influence upon human character a young man whom it was his personal pleasure to have picked out of the gutter of despair and meanness and set upon the road to success and usefulness by kind, considerate human treatment. He says, "If you know of such a one try it on him. It may be his hope realized, his shining star. You can never tell just when it appeals."

Prof. Stout gave a paper on mistakes; something to be remembered and taken to heart not only by teachers, but by all others as well, as

the defects it pointed out are those that mar the home and society as well as the school. Ignorance and arrogance, he cites as mistakes to be guarded against especially. Mr. Stout claims he is authority on mistakes it seems though "Our greatest glory is not in never falling, but" (as Prof. Stout personifies) "in rising every time we fall."

The discussion of the county high school question was handled in a most satisfactory manner by County School Supt. F. E. Bragg. Many questions were asked and answered shedding general light upon this important problem which is now before the people of Union county.

At noon the visitors and all were arranged in line for luncheon and one of those feasts—yes feast is the word—for which Blue Mountain Grange has long been famous was passed among them by a bevy of attentive lads and lasses. Judging from the way in which those platters, trays, dishes, etc., were emptied no one left his appetite at home.

Concluding the day County School Supt. E. E. Bragg extended in behalf of the teachers there assembled a vote of hearty thanks for the entertainment and banquet, not forgetting, as Mr. Bragg does, to say a good word for those who labor to prepare a sumptuous board.

Worthy Master of Blue Mountain Grange, C. D. Huffman extended, in behalf of the Grange their heartfelt appreciation of all that has been done on the part of the visitors to make the day the great success that it was.
