TWO BOYS RUN OVER SUNDAY

ONE RACES INTO MACHINE AND OTHER CAUGHT AT CORNER.

Both Bruised up But Not Seriously Injured by Accidents on Wheels.

Two boys, two bicycles and two

automobiles figured in two accidents on Adams avenue yesterday. Lloyd Fish, a young boy, collided with the John O'Connell automobile at Fir and Adams while both machines were moving at a fair rate of speed. The Fish boy was racing around the corner and was not watching just where he was going and dashed into the path of the O'Connell machine before any effort to stop either of the machines could be made. Earl and Lavon Zundel who were with Mr. O'Connell, corroborate the auto owner that it was the boy's fault entirely as he was using the pavement for a speed-way while coming around the corner. The boy was quite badly hurt but Dr. Molitor, his attending physician, asserts nothing serious resulted.

Ralph Pattison, son of Mr. and Mrs. F. W. Pattison, 704 Main avenue, was apparently the most seriously hurt of the two. He came within an ace of being killed. He was rounding the curve on a bicycle at Depot and Adams at the same time that Merrill Stoddard and a party were coming around the corner, running in the same direction. The rider stopped suddenly at the curb, and the automobile, which was also coming to a standstill, struck him, but at such an angle that one wheel scraped the curbing and lessening the weight of the youngster. The rider was run down and one front wheel ran on his arm just at the time it stopped. By standers lifted the auto while others extracted the young fellow. The accident scratched his face badly, hurt his arm and shoulder and in various other ways bruised him though not seriously. He was able to go to school this morning.

Had the automobile been running at a greater speed than it was fatal results would probably have occurred. Ralph was taken to the Newlin Drug store where Doctor Bacon dressed his injuries. The father of the boy, a local carpenter, was about to file charges against Mr. Stoddard but it is believed the case will be settled at a conference scheduled for this evening.

HAWAII'S BIG VOLCANO.

Curious Relics of Lava It Has Left in the Forests.

Hawaii possesses one of the greatest natural wonders of the present day world—a live volcano as high as Vesuvius and twice its diameter. Kilauea, on the island of Hawaii, stands thirty miles from the sea in a mountain range in which are three dead volcanoes and one partially alive. This last, called Mauna Loa, from time to time sends streams of lava down its slopes. In 1881 three streams burst forth from the sides of this mountain, and one of them came within three-quarters of a mile of Hilo, the chief city of the island. There have been several outbreaks of Kilauea in the last hundred years. In 1840 there was a brilliant eruption of lava, the light of which, it was said, could be seen a hundred miles away, while at the distance of forty miles one could read prior at midnight.

Where the lava flowed through the forest it has left curious relics in lava arches, bridges and great vases. These vases were formed by the lava piling itself about some lofty tree trunk, burning away the wood within and killing the upper part of the tree. In the course of time seeds were deposited in the open top, filled with decaying bark, until now there is a gigantic lava vase, holding ferns and flowers and vines.—Exchange.

A Coin Worth Millions. Somewhere in the world—possibly among the relics kept by some lover of the great Napoleon—there is a fortune, perhaps unsuspected. Among the coins Napoleon had minted were some millions of five franc pieces, and he determined to popularize these in an extraordinary way. In one of the coins, folded to a tiny size, was inclosed a note signed by Napoleon and promising the sum of 5,000,000 francs to the finder of that particular coin. Naturally everybody who changed a large piece demanded the new five franc coins in exchange and, as a rule, robbed and dug and sounded the metal in eager search for the hidden note. But the years went on, and yet the note did not appear. Napoleon's plighted word is a sacred trust to the French nation, and today the government stands ready to pay the debt, which, with interest, is now worth many millions.—London Answers.

DECISIONS ARE HANDED DOWN

TWO CASES AFFIRMED AND ONE REVERSED BY DEPARTMENT.

All the Cases Were Brought by Forestry Department Against Settlers.

Three decisions handed down by the local land office have been acted upon by the department and two stand approved and one is reversed, and by the way is the first reversal in a long time.

Register F. C. Bramwell ruled in two of them. In the case of U. S. vs. Mary Le Ballister of Grant county, the register ruled that the case brought by the forestry department was sufficient to warrant cancellation of entry. The department affirmed him. In the second case brought by the forestry department against Jno. Finemstein of this city the register decided for dismissal of the suit and was affirmed.

Receiver Eberhard ruled, a similar case in which the forestry department had instituted suit against Ada Pa., in favor of the plaintiff, but the department reversed and the entry is held for cancellation.

Advocates Home Rule Bill.

"The remedy is not in prohibition. It is in the Home Rule bill. This bill gives the right to the people who live in the cities to vote on and decide for themselves whether or not their city shall be wet or dry. It puts the control of the liquor traffic into the hands of the voters of each precinct so that every residential district is protected. It will prevent the county from wiping out the city vote on city measures—it is a law which makes prohibition possible where prohibition is wanted and impossible where not wanted."
