### Vote No on Annexation.

The portion of Washington county proposed to be annexed to Multnomah is seven miles wide, contains 112 of our 730 sections, four and a half of our fifteen millions of taxable property, one fourth of our voters and population and one-half of our railroad mileage. 500 voters of this strip have signed a remonstrance against annexation—a clear majority, as less than 300 signed the petition and about 900 votes were cast at the last general election. In addition many who first favored annexation now oppose it and say the cut was made too deep. We ask you to vote No on Washington-Multnomah division—W. D. Wood, Chairman Anti-Annexation Committee Hillsboro, Oregon.
