ANCIENT YUCATAN.

Its Mysterious Ruins Once the Scene of Heiman Sacrifices.

It was Chichen-Chicou Itza the magnificent, the Taj Mahal of Central America—and the building we were gazing on was the most wonderful of the ruined group.

As we looked upon it in the moon light we could not help feeling how awe inspiring this colossal temple, rearing itself 120 feet into the air, must have been to the ancients. On the top of the pyramid still stand the crumbling ruins of a temple. It is reached by a stairway on each side of its four sides, having 120 steps apiece, and contains three rooms, the doorposts of which are carved with the figures of priests, except the one facing eastward, which has large pillars carved into the forms of serpents. The heads of these are turned so that they lie flat upon the top of the pyramid, their eye sockets still bearing traces of the rich green jade that once filled them.

As we sat we pictured to ourselves the strange and barbaric scenes that had here been enacted, for legends are to be believed it was on these flattened serpents' heads that the tyrant priests of the Itzas, majestic in their jeweled and befeathered robes, tore out the palpitating hearts of their sacrificial victims after slicing open the breasts with a silex knife.

These sacrifices were probably performed in view of thousands of worshippers of the sun deity congregated on the plain below, the heart after it was torn from the membranes being burned as an offering in the inner holy of holies, while the body of the victim rolled down the stone steps to be sacramentally eaten by the people.—World Wide Magazine.
