To whom it may concern: Notice is hereby given that in pursuance of a resolution adopted by the Common Council of the city of La Grande on the 5th day of August, 1909, creating Improvement District No. 4 and designating Washington avenue as such district, and in pursuance of a resolution adopted by said Common Council on the 28th day of September, 1910, whereby said Council determined and declared its intention to improve all that portion of Washington avenue, in said improvement district, hereinafter described, by laying thereon cement walk, the Council will, ten days after the service of this notice upon the owners of the property affected

and benefited by such improvement, order that said above described improvement be made; that boundaries of said district to be so improved are as follows: All that portion of Washington avenue from the east curb line of First street, to the west curb line of Spruce street. Notice is hereby further given that the Council will levy a special assessment on all the property affected and benefited by such improvement for the purpose of paying for such improvement. That the estimated cost of such improvement is the sum of \$8061.35. That the Council will on the 9th day of November, 1910, meet at the Council chamber at the hour of 8 o'clock at p. m. to consider said estimated cost, and the levy of said assessment, when a hearing will be granted to any person feeling aggrieved by such assessment.
