

MURDERED MAN AMERICAN SAYS NEW RUMOR

MAN OVER WHOM MEXICAN OUT-BREAK OCCURRED BORN IN NEW MEXICO.

NO RIOTING EARLY TODAY

Message Believed to Have Been Sent from State Department to Taft Intercepted at Fort Leavenworth Today Throws New Light on Mexican Troubles—Editors of Unruly Newspapers Will Be Arrested.

Fort Leavenworth, Nov. 12.—A message referring to the anti-American riots in Mexico, believed being sent to President Taft, who is enroute to Panama, by the state department was picked up here. It said, "Editors of incendiary newspapers will be arrested. Am informed on able authority that Rodriguez was born in New Mexico, and was an American citizen."

News Indicates Quietness.
New York, Nov. 12.—Private advices say all is quiet in Mexico.

No Bullfights Tomorrow.

El Paso, Tex., Nov.—Reports from Guadalajara say outbreaks may occur soon but all is quiet today and with troops patrolling the streets. As a precaution bull fights throughout the republic will be prohibited for tomorrow.

No arrests have been made the last twenty-four hours. It is believed that there is little fear of more outbreaks outside of the state of Jasco. Rioting in Ciudad Porfirio Diaz, where the American consulate was attacked and partially wrecked yesterday has been stopped an today the little town is reported quiet.

The Mexican consul at Eagle Pass today began an investigation of the lynching of Rodriguez at Rock Springs whose death was the cause of the late unpleasantness. Governor Campbell of Texas arranged to give him all necessary protection. In the meantime the authorities are investigating the matter on their own account and will report direct to the state department.

GOV. HAWLEY AT SANATORIUM, RESTING

WINNER IN BOISE GUBERNATORIAL CAMPAIGN TAKING REST.

Other Politicians Gather at Hot Lake This Afternoon.

Hot Lake, Nov. 12 (Special).—Politicians from two states are gathered here today. Governor-elect J. H. Hawley, democratic, has come here to rest after his strenuous campaign against Governor Brady, the present incumbent. Mr. Hawley is accompanied by D. H. Moseley, county commissioner at Boise, and who is an old-time friend of Hawley.

In addition to the Idaho politicians, Senator-elect J. M. Burgess, the man who defeated Dr. Smith for joint senator from Morrow and Idaho county is also here and R. N. Confield of the Coe-Stanfield common irrigators in Umatilla county, is also at the Lake.

BRADY CONCEDES DEFEAT; BLAMES RAILROADS

HAWLEY'S MAJORITY WILL NOT BE OVER TEN HUNDRED.

Reports From Oregon Bring Out No New Features Today.

Boise, Nov. 12.—The latest returns indicate that Hawley, Democrat, was elected governor over Governor Brady, Republican, by eight to ten hundred. Brady, conceding his defeat, attributes the result to a plank in the Republican platform endorsing a state railroad commission which the railroads bitterly fought. A wild scramble is on among the Democratic office seekers as the party is in power the first time since 1892.

Monmouth Seems Safe.

Portland, Nov. 12.—Practically complete returns continue to indicate that the Monmouth normal won but the Ashland and Weston normal bills for maintenance were lost by several thousand. This morning there was a total vote of 6851 cast against Weston, including Umatilla county. The county boundary bills were lost by approximately 3300 votes, meaning there will be no new counties in Oregon.

Many Women Given Votes.

Spokane, Wash., Nov. 11 (Special).—One hundred and thirty thousand women were added to the voting strength of the state of Washington by the adoption of an amendment for equal suffrage to the constitution at the election on November 8. Formal announcement will be made by Governor Hay within 10 days or as soon as the official canvass of the returns has been completed. Women, who are taxpayers, also are eligible for jury duty. The women of Spokane will probably cast their first votes at an election to ratify the new charter, which provides for a commission form of government.

Mrs. May Arkwright Hutton of Spokane, president of the Washington Political Equality league, entertained her co-workers and a large number of advocates of equal suffrage at a banquet the evening of November 10, when it was announced that November 24 has been set aside as a special day of Thanksgiving for the newly enfranchised women of the state. Mrs. Hutton said:

"I attribute the success of the movement largely to the broadminded ideas of the men of Washington, who stand for a square deal in all things. Another reason for our success is the fact that the management of the campaign has been at all times under the control of the women of the state. Minnie J. Reynolds, formerly of Colorado, did excellent work and to her women of this state owe much for their great victory at the polls last Tuesday."

SUCCESSOR TO WEALTHY WOMAN DOLLIVER IS SELECTED

EDITOR OF DES MOINES PAPER HONORED WITH NOMINATION TO U. S. SENATE.

ILLINOIS HOUSE DEMOCRATIC

Governor Carroll This Afternoon Made Selection of Candidate Successor to Late Senator Dolliver—Man Is Conservative—Three Men Prominently Mentioned for the Position—Illinois House Democratic.

Des Moines, Nov. 12.—Governor Carroll has appointed Lafayette Young to succeed the late Senator Dolliver in the United States senate today.

The appointment of Young will mean war in the legislature which is one third Republican, one third Progressive and a third Democratic. The report that Carroll will seek the senate ship has not been confirmed.

Now that Carroll is re-elected governor, politicians were anxiously awaiting his selection and appointment of a successor to the late Senator Dolliver. The favorite is Lafayette Young, editor of the Des Moines Capital. Other candidates were Congressman Smith, Judge Kenyon and former Congressman Lacy. There was no chance of Carroll appointing a progressive as the progressives oppose him.

Illinois House Democratic.

Chicago, Nov. 12.—Control of the lower house of the Illinois legislature will probably be democratic. Practically complete returns indicate that the Republicans and Democrats tied with seventy-five votes each but the Prohibitionists and one Independent will probably vote with the Democrats thus giving them a majority.

LEO TOLSTOI DISAPPEARS SUDDENLY

London, Nov. 12.—The family of Count Leo Tolstoi are distraught at his disappearance today and organized a searching party. Before leaving the famed writer wrote the family that he intended to retire to seclusion, according to Moscow dispatches. Tolstoi wrote to his wife: "I can no longer, endure a life surrounded by luxury. Like many other old men I am going to retire from the world. I contemplate a life of solitude and am going to ask that you not seek my place of sojourn or come to it if it is discovered. I beg forgiveness for any grief I may cause you." ORCHARDISTS TO BE PUNISHED FOR NEGLIGENCE

COUNTY FRUIT INSPECTOR ANNOUNCES RIGID MEASURES.

Corvallis Expert Finds Traces of Disease in Union and Cove.

Rigid prosecution is about to be instituted against orchardists in the vicinity of Union and Cove for neglect to fight blight, according to Fruit Inspector Stilwell, who in company with Prof. Jackson, the renowned blight expert located at Corvallis, have just returned from a tour of inspection in that end of the valley. During the past summer traces of blight made their appearance and the inspector says the orchard owners made little or no attempt to fight it. The time to war against blight is when it first appears, agree the experts, and the inspector has decided to invoke the law on those who have neglected to do so. The offense is a serious one and the officer and blight experts all agree that if the law is enforced rigidly when blight first appears, there will be little trouble later.

Benz Car Wins.

Savannah, Ga., Nov. 12.—David B. Brown in a Benz car won the grand prize cup in an automobile race here this afternoon. He finished two minutes ahead of Pemery, also in a Benz. Brown took the lead at the end of the twenty-third lap and kept it.

Apples Create Difficulties.

St. Paul, Minn., Nov. 11 (Special).—The increasing production of apples in the Northwest has furnished a problem which the great railway systems centering in St. Paul will have to solve. Howard Elliott, president of the Northern Pacific, also president of the National Apple show which will be held for the third time in Spokane, Wash., November 14 to 19, in his opening address will discuss the question from various standpoints.

Despite the fact that thousands of new trees have been planted and the 1909 crop of apples in the Yakima valley, Washington, the Bitter Root Valley, Montana, the Wenatchee district on the Great Northern in Oregon and the various apple districts in Idaho is the largest for several years, the demand for apples and the new markets opened in all parts of the work, will take every apple raised.

It is the getting of these apples to market with which the railroads are concerned. American apples are always at a premium in Europe. Far away Egyptians have taken to the fruit and want all they can get of it.

BELLE CRIPPEN IN ALBERTA TOWN IS BELIEF

WOMAN ACTS STRANGELY WHEN SHE HEARS NEWS OF CRIPPEN'S FATE IN LONDON.

WILL BE ARRESTED SOON

Faints Twice, and Each Time When Some Direct Word of Dr. Crippen Reaches Her—Reaches Alberta Town and Disappears for a Day Only to Return Again the Next—Coincides With All Descriptions.

Allx, Alberta, Nov. 12.—Considerable excitement has been caused here by the rumor that a woman who arrived Wednesday is Belle Crippen for whose alleged death Crippen is sentenced to hang in London. The woman went to a livery stable and got a rig and disappeared. Then she returned the next day. While waiting for her buggy a man nearby remarked: "I Guess Crippen is going to hang." The woman fainted.

Later she read in a newspaper concerning Crippen's fate and fainted again.

Her description tallies with the woman's description and the police have the woman under surveillance and maybe she will be arrested.

Special Jury Adjourns.

Los Angeles, Nov. 12.—The special grand jury investigating the Times explosion adjourned today until next Tuesday. More witnesses will be subpoenaed.

OLD EXPLORER SUICIDES.

Man of Prominence in Army Life Dies Homeless and Poor.

Seattle, Nov. 12.—Penniless and alone in the world, Judge Linquist, a member of the expedition that searched the Arctic for Explorer Greeley, committed suicide early today in a cheap hotel. In an old suitcase were found discharges from the army and navy and letters and credentials which told of a life of hardship and bravery.

BLACKMAILER AT PORTLAND AND ESCAPES

WEALTHY SALOON MAN ASKED TO CONTRIBUTE \$1,000.

Police Given Case but so far Have Not Been Able to Land Man.

Portland, Ore., Nov. 12.—A plain clothesman guarded "Pete" Bruno, a wealthy saloonman today while the police scoured the north end for the author of a threatening letter received by Bruno in which he was told to deposit \$1,000 in currency in a mail box in a first street lodging house under pain of death if he refused to act.

He advised the police and cut up paper like bills and placed them in the designated spot. Detectives hid nearby but the man did not put in his appearance.

Bruno thinks he is a marked victim of foreigners. A few days ago an Italian cook was murdered in front of Bruno's saloon and the murderer escaped. Soon afterward a strange Italian rushed into the saloon and told Bruno that he would pay for the death of the man, despite Bruno's innocence in the affair.
