November 19—Everybody's day, awarding of prizes, exhibits will remain intact until 10:30 o'clock at night when preparation will begin to repack six prize winning cars, 36 district exhibits and all the prize-winning commercial displays for exhibition in the First Regiment armory, Chicago.

Rice, secretary and manager of the show, announced this morning that a special train of 14 decorated cars, accompanied by 40 growers, trustees of the apple show and five employees will leave the morning of November 21 for Chicago, where the show will open on November 28 and continue until December 4. Bert E. Gregory, assistant manager, writes that the Chicago Association of Commerce, will have a delegation of 1500 at the opening of the show.
