New Shop Building Will be Huge Affair—Railroad News Items.

After months of good conduct she became troublesome today and instead of going out with Number six as planned for her, she was derailed at the coal chute by a broken steel and necessitated considerable work in being rerailed. The steel, the framework of the structure, is partially erected, and the brickwork is well commenced. finished shortly.

The round house floor, which has been giving more or less trouble since the structure was built, is being torn up in several places and repaired with gravel foundation.
