SOUNDS LIKE A TRUST.

Big Rubber Company Indicates It Has Stronghold on Rubber Goods.

Washington, Nov. 17 (Special)—An enterprise that bears all the earmarks of a venture by the rubber trust is the theme of a report made by United States Consul, James T. Du Bois, at Singapore.

"A big rubber company," he says, "organized by American capital and now partially owned by English capitalists, has secured tapping rights over all of the government forest reserves in the Federated Malay states."

"The territory includes about 5,000,000 acres, and the company has obtained the right to tap all jelatong trees on this wide area for a period of ten years, with a renewal privilege for seven years more. This company holds also large rights in South Borneo, in Sarawak, and in the Karimion Islands. They turned out 325,000 pounds of jelatong last year and realized for their recent sales \$1.25 a pound.

"On the Karimion Islands, situated a short distance south of Singapore, the company is erecting a \$300,000 factory in addition to the large one now in operation in Sarawak. This factory will handle all the jelatong received from concessions outside of Sarawak. It is claimed that early in 1911, when the mills will be in full operation, they can produce 6,000,000 pounds of jelatong gum, 10,000,000 pounds in 1912, and 12,000,000 in 1913. These are estimates made by those in trusted in this great enterprise which promises to monopolize the jelatong market."

The dominating interest of the Americans in the concession is indicated by the fact that of last year's shipments, 12,824 tons came to the United States, 1,009 to Great Britain and 5,093 to continental Europe.

TAME BEARS A MENACE.

Yellowstone Park Statistics for Year Prove Interesting Reading.

Washington, Nov. 15 (Special)—Tame bears are almost as dangerous to have around the house as wild grizzlies, according to the annual report of the Acting Superintendent of Yellowstone National Park, Major H. C. Benson, of the Fifth Cavalry, made public today. In part Benson says:

"Many complaints were received during the summer of damages in various camps by bears. They frequently become so tame that they do not hesitate to destroy tents or go through windows into houses to secure food, and sometimes they refuse even to be driven away.

"One man working in a camp near Excelsior Geyser was quite severely bitten and scratched by a bear that he tried to drive away from the supply tent during the night. He was confined to the hospital for 12 days as a result of his injuries, and his companion who ran to his assistance also received some scratches. It was thought that it would become necessary to kill some of these vicious bears and many requests to do so were received from parties who suffered from their depredations, but this was not resorted to.

A herd of 29 wild buffalo were seen in Pelican valley on February 23, and a small herd of five was seen on Cache creek on February 2. One bull died during the winter in the vicinity of Yellowstone Lake, and its skeleton and hide were sent to the National Museum, Washington, as specimens.

"Moose are frequently seen in the southern and also in the southeastern

parts of the park, and are believed to be increasing in number.

"The estimated number of elk in the park is from 20,000 to 40,000. Many of these elk wander out of the park into adjoining states, and a few of them are killed during the season. An occasional one may also be killed inside the border of the park, but such poaching is very limited.

Deer and antelope are still numerous in the park although during the winter many antelope escape from the boundary. Both the black-tailed, or mule deer, and the white-tailed or Virginia deer, are found in the park. About 800 of the black-tailed and 400 of the white-tailed were fed during the past winter.

"The herd of tame buffalo under fence in the park continues to thrive and the increase is satisfactory. The herd now numbers 121 head, of which 28 are this year's calves. Probably 6,000 tourists visited this herd during the summer, it being one of the main features of the stop at Mammoth Hot Springs."

The grand total of visitors in the season of 1910 is given approximately as 19,575. Ten small fires were discovered but they were extinguished by the park patrols and soldiers during the summer.
