To whom it may concern: Notice is hereby given that in pursuance of a resolution adopted by the Common Council of the City of La Grande, Oregon, on the 9th day of November, 1910, creating 'improvement District No. 27 and designating N. 2nd street as such district, and in pursuance of a resolution adopted by said Common Council on the 2nd day of November 1910, whereby said council determined and declared its intention to improve all that portion of N. 2nd street, in said improvement district as herein after described, by laying thereon macadam pavement, the Council, will ten days after the service of this notice upon the owners of the property affected and benefitted by such improvement, order that said above described improvement be made; that boundaries of said district to be so improved are as follows: All that portion of North Second street from the O. R. & N. side of the R. R. track to the center of Lake avenue. Notice is hereby further given that the Council will levy a special assessment on all the property affected and benefitted by such improvement for the purpose of paying for such improvement. That the estimated cost of such improvement is the sum of \$13,500.00. WRECKS COME IN BUNCHES.

Three Wrecks Follow Each Other in Rapid Succession This Week.

Pendleton, Nov. 18.—The East Oregonian said last night:

The railroad man's ancient superstition that wrecks never occur singly but always occur in threes seems to have been borne out by railroad happenings in Oregon, Washington and Idaho yesterday and last night. Beginning with the wreck on the Oregon Short Line Wednesday morning and ending with the wreck on the Washington division of the O. R. & N. at Juniper station, 30 miles northwest of Pendleton early this morning, three wrecks followed each other in rapid succession.

The third one occurred on the Northern Pacific near Evans station in Washington, thereby distributing the wrecks between the three northwest states and the three principal northwest roads.

The Juniper wreck also involved a freight train. Five empty box cars were derailed in some unknown manner, completely blocking the line to traffic for several hours. On account of this wreck the Soo-Spokane-Portland train No. 14, passed through Pendleton this morning on her way to Spokane. The train left Pendleton immediately after the Walla Walla local pulled in at 10:05.

A Northern Pacific mixed train, in charge of Conductor G. F. Churchill and Engineer Arbogast, running from Dayton to Walla Walla, was wrecked at 8 o'clock last night at Evans. From some unknown cause the fourth car from the engine jumped the track, causing all the cars behind it, a fruit car, a stock car, baggage car and a day coach, to go into the ditch. No one of the passengers or train crew was injured. A steer in the stock car was killed. It is thought the train was traveling at the rate of about 25 miles an hour when the disaster occurred.

A special from Dayton, Washington says that while motor car No. 3 on the O. R. & N. was speeding towards Dayton last night, a shot was fired through the window of the engine room, missing Engineer D. R. Terrell by a hair's breadth. The bullet shattered a window above Engineer Terrell's head and taking a diagonal course passed through another window on the opposite side of the car.

COYOTE BELIEVED RABID.

Inspector Uncertain as Carcass Was Burned up Before His Arrival.

W. H. Lytle, the Pendleton man who is state sheep inspector and state veterinary, passed through La Grande yesterday on his way home after having been out upon an investigation of a coyote that had been killed in Wallawa county and was suspected of having been rabid. The coyote had bitten John Bosley, a little boy living near Flora and also two dogs, a pig and a goose. The boy is now in Portland for medical treatment and Dr. Lytle has recommended that he be sent to San Francisco where there is a Pasteur Institute.

Upon his arrival at Flora Dr. Lytle found that the coyote in question had been completely burned, so he could not determine from first hand information whether or not the animal was afflicted with rabies. However, he secured the two dogs and the pig and is now waiting to see how they will fare. The pig was left at Flora while the two dogs were taken to Portland and delivered to Dr. White, secretary of the state board of health. Dr. Lytle says it is impossible to say whether or not the coyote was rabid.

Until further developments occur. He says it is possible the animal may have gotten an overdose of strychnine. An overdose of that poison would have made the animal ravenously hungry and might have brought on the hysteria which caused him to run amuck.

This is the second case of this sort that has been reported to the state veterinarian. The first case was reported from Bly, but in that case as in the case at Flora, the coyote was destroyed. In southern Idaho many instances have been reported where coyotes were suspected of being rabid. Therefore the subject is one of importance and Dr. Lytle is determined to ascertain the facts in the present case as thoroughly as possible. If the Flora coyote was rabid the sheep dogs that were bitten will soon bear evidence to that fact.
