BEAVERS GROWING SCARCE. Michigan Warden Gives High Price of Products as One Reason.

State Game and Fish Warden Pierce says the fur-bearing animals of the state are rapidly becoming extinct, says a Michigan exchange and that it will probably be but a few years when they will have passed. There are two reasons given to show such is the case. One is that prices of skins and hides of fur-bearing animals are constantly increasing and another is that old trappers of the state are more than anxious that our state laws be made still more binding to protect the animals that furnish a living for hundreds of trappers in the state.

Despite rigid laws there are hunters and trappers who are constantly violating the game laws and Warden Pierce has issued instructions to his deputies this season to be more than ever on the alert for this class of violators who persist in trapping and hunting out of season. The number of convictions seems to be rapidly on the increase.

Of the various fur-bearing animals the beaver is the only one in the long list that is protected the entire year, and these animals cannot be killed until 1913, and in all probability the legislature will extend the time when the limit expires.

According to Warden Pierce there are few violations of the law in killing this animal, because it is generally known that they are not to be killed for several years to come and considerable difficulty is experienced in disposing of the skins.

ONLY DAUGHTER PASSES AWAY
LAST NIGHT OF APPENDICITIS.

Second Death In Three Months Which
Has Brought Sorrow to Home.

Death, the second time in three months, robbed the home of Mr. and Mrs. Harry U. Myers last night, when Gladys D. the 10-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Myers succumbed to the ravages of gangrene following a severe attack of appendicitis. A week ago yesterday Gladys returned home from school seriously ill and though an operation was performed, it was found that the disease had advanced too far before the victim gave in. Three months ago, Arlo, the oldest one of the three children died after a brief illness and with the second visitation by death, but one child remains. Jay Myers, slightly older than his sister at the time of her death. Gladys was ten years last August.

While not definitely announced, it is believed the funeral will be held next Sunday.
