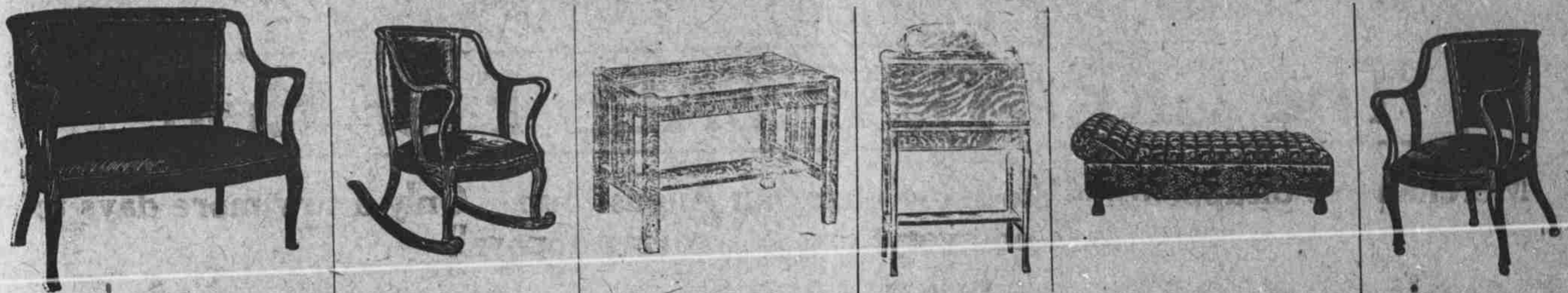

To whom it may concern: Notice is hereby given that in pursuance of a resolution adopted by the Common Council of the City of La Grande, Oregon, on the 9th day of November, 1910, creating Improvement District No. 27 and designating N. 2nd street as such district, and in pursuance of a resolution adopted by said Common Council on the 2nd day of November 1910, whereby said council determined and declared its intention to improve all that portion of N. 2nd street, in said improvement district as herein-after described, by laying thereon macadam pavement, the Council, will ten days after the service of this notice upon the owners of the property affected and benefited by such improvement, order that said above described improvement be made; that boundaries of said district to be so improved are as follows: All that portion of North Second street from the O. R. & N. side of the R. R. track to the center of Lake avenue. Notice is hereby further given that the Council will levy a special assessment on all the property affected and benefited by such improvement for the purpose of paying for such improvement. That the estimated cost of such improvement is the sum of \$13,500.00.

That the Council will on the 23rd day of November, 1910, meet at the Council chamber at the hour of 8 o'clock p. m., to consider said estimated cost, and the levy of said assessment, when a hearing will be granted to any person feeling aggrieved by such assessment.
