TURKEYS BUT FEW GEESE

MARKET WILL EVENTUALLY CLOSE WITH 25 CENTS.

Geese Selling at 18 Cents Are Not Sufficient for Demands.

With the rush for turkeys at its highest here this afternoon and evening and the price not apparently on the slump as it is in Portland, it is

likely that the markets will close with the big bird commanding the usual price, 25 cents. The supply in La Grande is plentiful and all who so desire can be supplied according to opinions expressed by the dealers.

Geese are more on the scarce order, and while they sell at 18 cents the supply is not nearly as good as the turkey.

With fresh eggs at a premium and selling at a half dollar a dozen, many a housewife is scheming about today to make that huge dinner tomorrow without the albuminous food stuff. They are so scarce that only those who are being supplied by farmers direct enjoy the costly luxury. Packed goods sell at 40 cents and many who have not solved the mystery of cooking without eggs are buying the packed material. All in all Thanksgiving dinners in La Grande this year will be expensive.
