Glacial Lake Breaks Forth.

Cordova Alaska, Nov. 25.—The num-
ber of dead settlers and miners,
drowned yesterday in sections of
Bering valley by a flood is not as-
certained today but it is believed that

many perished. Scores of houses were
washed away.

The disaster was caused by the es-
cape of a vast volume of water from
the glacial lake in Bering mountain.
Great icebergs crashed from the
slopes into Bering river which has

risen 10 feet and is steadily rising.
This is the second peculiar glacial
outbreak in this part of Alaska in
the last two years. Great damage
was done before when a similar inter-
nal lake broke from Miles glacier in
Copper river valley.
