The Church Bells.

It is said that in ancient church parish of Newark, near London, a curious custom prevails of ringing, at an unworked hour of the night, all the church bells. This is done so violently on each Sunday night of the months of October and November. It originated thus: In the reign of Queen Elizabeth a rich merchant named Gofer was one October night lost in the dense woods then surrounding Newark. He had a large sum of money on his person and the forest was infested with thieves. Suddenly he heard the sound of bells, and guided by their music was enabled to reach home and safety. In commemoration of his escape, Hofer left a sum of money for the

Newark bell ringers, on condition that during the months of October and November the bells should be rung every Sunday night. This has been observed now for three hundred years, religiously, and when in the autumn the people hear the bells they say, "They are ringing for Hofer."

When we hear the bells ringing in our times and town, we can know they are only calling the people to the house of God where they may find the safety they need for their souls.

Notice is hereby given that in pursuance of a resolution adopted by the Common Council of the City of La Grande, Oregon, on the 15th day of December, 1909, creating Improvement district No. 12, and designating N. Fir street, as such district, and in pursuance of a resolution adopted by said Common Council on the 2nd day of November, 1910, whereby said Council determined and declared its intention to improve all that portion of N. Fir street, in said improvement district as hereinafter described, by laying thereon Bithulitic Pavement, the Council will, ten days after the service of this notice upon the owners of the property affected and benefited by such improvement, order that said above described improvement be made; that boundaries of said district to be so improved are as follows:
All that portion of N. Fir street, from the South Curb Line of Monroe Avenue to the North Line of S. avenue. Notice is hereby further given that the Council will levy a special assess-

ment on all the property affected and benefited by such improvement for the purpose of paying for such improvement. That the estimated cost of such improvement is the sum of \$2529.40. That the Council will on the 7th day of December, 1910, meet at the Council chamber at the hour of 8 o'clock P. M., to consider said estimated cost, and the levy of said assessment, when a hearing will be granted to any person feeling aggrieved by such assessment.
