Election Notice.

December 12th, 1910.
Notice is hereby given that on the 12th day of December, 1910, a general election will be held in the City of La Grande, in the County of Union, State of Oregon, for the purpose of electing the following officers:

- Mayor
- Recorder
- Chief of Police
- Treasurer

One Councilman from each ward. That at said election there will be submitted to the voters of the City the following question: "Shall the Council of the City be authorized to issue and negotiate bonds of the City in the sum of \$10,000 to bear interest not to exceed 5 per cent per annum, to run for a period of twenty (20) years from date, redeemable and pay-

able at any time after ten (10) years from date at the option of the City, which bonds are to be issued and sold for the purpose of completing the sewer system in the City of La Grande."

That at said election there will also be submitted to the voters of the City the question: "Shall sections 6 and 7 of the Charter of the City be amended so as to provide for the appointment of Chief of Police by the Mayor, instead of being elected by the voters of the City?"

The polling places designated for said election, and the judges and clerks appointed to conduct said election are as follows: First ward—Polling place, Court House. Judges: M. P. Sheasley, Jacob Baker, M. McClurray; Clerks: Elmer Curtis and E. W. Kammerer.
