ACKERMAN CALLS MEETING

COUNTY SUPERINTENDENT TO MEET IN PORTLAND.

Prominent Speakers Will Discuss the Question of Vital Importance.

County Superintendent E. E. Bragg has received a call to attend a meeting of Oregon county superintendents at Portland, December 20. Matters of importance to the education department of the state will be discussed, and Superintendent Ackerman has announced the appended program for the meeting.

State Superintendent Dewey, of Washington, will speak. Miss Luella Bond Chapman is also on the programme. Topics have been selected as follows:

I. County Institutes—(a) Best time for holding; (b) how much of the time should be devoted to inspirational work, and how much to informational work; (c) value of class exercises; (d) value of instruction by local talent.

II. Needed school legislation. The resolutions adopted by the conference of the chief state school officers of the North, Central and West Central States at Salt Lake City, November 17, 18, 19, 1910, a copy of which resolutions I herewith hand you.

IV. Miscellaneous topics—(a) How can the superintendent secure better buildings and better school spirit? (b) How keep the schools of the county in close touch with the best educational thought outside the county? (c) What kind of an examination should we give the eighth-grade graduates? (d) How to get rid of the teacher who goes to the fence of the law, though does not violate the same; (e) When inspecting, what should the superintendent see and do? (1) Outside the school room; (2) Indoors. (f) Manual training in rural schools. (g) Rural school graduates (h) Should the County Superintendent be given the power to select teachers for the schools of the county?
