CONGRESS CONVENES.

In Wall Street. It is suggested, too, that those men in the operation of great trusts, financial institutions and railroads, have tolled not for the benefit of the people, but at their expense. The appearance of the Aldrich bill would be the signal for one of the greatest struggles in the history of Congress.

Apportionment of Senates.

Apportionment is a matter of politics. It can be used to have an important effect on party strength and is therefore a fit issue for strenuous contention. In some cases it touches state pride and of course, that impels Senators and Representatives from those states to reach for their war paint.

In the natural course of events the number of Representatives for the next ten years, based on the new census, would be decided by Congress at the present session. Action would be proceeded by computations by the shrewdest party strategists to determine what number of people per congressman would produce the largest proportion of Republicans. Nobody knows better than the Democrats the advantage of this apportioning privilege and they are relied upon to do everything possible to block action until the next Congress. A Democratic House would then work out the problem with a Republican Senate and the former would be able to protect their interests.

During the past 10 years the House has had 391 members, each representing 193,167 people. In the preceding 10 years there were 356 Congressmen, each representing 173,901 of the population. If the present number of members should be retained the ratio would be raised to an extent that would cause a number of states to lose some representatives. The painful operation would be borne by none of those states without horrible resistance. If the number of members should be reduced the losses of the slow-growing states would be larger and their protests much louder. Many members contend that the House with 391 representatives is now too large to be a deliberate body and is forced to do its work through committees and accept their recommendations. Census Director Durand, will prepare for the use of Congress statistics showing the proportion of population to House membership ranging from 359 to 475.

The Prominent Measures.

An array of bills to be considered, and some of them to be fought over, relate to:

The Panama Canal.
Federal Incorporation.
Ship Subsidy.
Issuing of injunctions.
Conservation.
Locomotive Boiler Inspection.
Alaska, form of government, natural resources and railroads.
Bureau of Public Health.
Cold Storage law.

Fortify Panama.

All of these subjects, except cold storage, will in all probability be discussed in the President's annual message. As to the Panama Canal, Congress will be called upon to consider the question of fortifications and the form of permanent government in the canal zone. It is probable that a large majority of Congress joins with the president in favor of the guarding of the canal and Taft will undoubtedly call for an appropriation for that purpose. The zone is now governed by the Canal commission, a make-shift arrangement to serve during the construction of the waterway. With the canal in operation the zone will gradually acquire a population of considerable number, large business interests will be established and there will be need for a settled government. Col. Geo. W. Goethals, who has charge of the work on the canal, is said to have recommended to the President the adoption of military control. President Taft has not intimated his opinion in the matter. Although it is a little early, the question of tolls may be brought to the attention of the legislators.

Federal Corporation Charters.

President Taft repeatedly has urged the enactment of a law providing that federal charters be granted to corporations. Attorney General Wickersham wrote a bill to carry out the idea but it has not been received with favor by Congress.

An ocean mail subsidy to encourage the building up of the merchant marine and especially to assist in the establishment of steamship lines to

planks in the President's platform. An effort to pass a subsidy bill at the last session developed a scandal and an investigation by a House committee, with the result that no action was taken by Congress. A determined effort will be made by friends of the proposition to pass a bill in the present congress.

Injunctions Also Up.

The President is also strongly in favor of a law to limit the power of federal judges in issuing injunctions. He would deny the issuing of any injunction without a hearing attended by both sides of the controversy, unless delay would cause irreparable injury to the applicant for the writ. In the latter event the judge would be required to write in the court record the character of the threatened injury and he might issue a temporary injunction on which there should be a hearing within five days. Under the present law, a judge can extend a temporary injunction indefinitely without giving the enjoined party a hearing.

Seven of the bills bearing on the conservation of natural resources submitted to Congress by the President in the last session were held up by committees. At least some of those will be brought up for passage.

A bill to have locomotive boilers examined by government inspectors was the subject of investigation by a Senate committee last spring. It has strong support, and an effort will be made to have it passed. The railroad companies are bitterly opposed to the bill.

Alaskan Question Noted.

Alaska is a hard problem. The present government consists of a governor appointed by the President and Congress, acting as a territorial legislature. A better form of government is greatly needed. The population is so scattered, however, and the interests of widely separated sections so varied that it has not been possible to devise a satisfactory plan. The administration formulated a bill last session, but it received so hostile a reception by the Senate that it was withdrawn after very limited consideration.

There is great need for the development of coal lands, at least to the extent of supplying the people of Alaska residents of towns located only a few miles from rich coal fields are required to pay \$18 a ton for coal brought from British Columbia. An effort will be made to pass a bill opening up some of the coal fields on leases that will protect the government and assure reasonable prices to consumers.

Railroads are also needed for the development of the territory and bills to provide for their construction will be in the legislative grist of business.

President Taft is on record as being in favor of combining all government agencies for the protection of public health in to a Bureau of Public Health. A bill to carry out the plan is pending in Congress and has been the subject of a vigorous fight that has prevented its passage. Its opponents claim that the creation of such a bureau would result in its control by a certain school of medicine and that it would be a "doctor's trust."

Senator Heyburn (Rpn. Idaho) is chairman of the committee on manufactures, the members of which spent much time last session in the investigation of the storage of food. He will present a bill to regulate storage. It is a complicated subject because, while some kinds of food deteriorate in storage for a few months, others will keep in good condition for years. It is not altogether a question of cold storage. Heat has to be provided in the low temperature of winter to preserve some articles of food.

Bailinger Trouble Aired.

A feature of the session will be the report of the congressional commission that conducted the Bailinger-Pinchot investigation. The report of the minority of the committee has been made public, and it is expected that the majority will be heard from very early in the session.

Reports will be received from the Senate Committee that is investigating the alleged "third degree" method of extorting information from prisoners and a House committee that has been making an inquiry into charges that

certain lawyers plan to extract three million dollars or more in attorney fees from Indians of the Five Civilized tribes.
