Farmers to Blame.

Chicago, Dec. 13.—The high cost of living is being blamed partially on farmers today by Sir Horace Plunkett, president of the Irish Agricultural society, here touring the country for the purpose of studying agricultural condition. "Unless the American farmer organizes, distributes his own products there cannot be reduction in high living either here or abroad," he said. "In this way the farmer would reduce the portion of middlemen's profits and thus make more money.
