CHICAGO TEAM WINS

Mob Breaks up the Game Before the Wenatchee Contest is Ended.

A Seattle dispatch says: Oak Park high school today met and humbled the Wenatchee high school team in a game for the championship of the Pacific Northwest, by rolling up 22 to 0.

It was a great battle, but the affair was marred by the rioting of the crowd toward the end of the game, which compelled Referee Varnell of Spokane to call the contest to a close, eight minutes before "time was up."

Wenatchee was outclassed at every point by the Chicago boys, but the game was made interesting by the brilliancy with which play after play that had never before been seen on a Western gridiron.

Oak Park scored three times on touchdowns, kicking one goal and twice on place kicks. Wenatchee never got nearer Chicago's goal than the 25-yard line, and that only once.

Wenatchee, hitherto undefeated, had a slight advantage in weight, but the team work was poor, the boys were slow on their feet, and at times seemed to suffer from stagefright.

Oak Park's startling plays went off like clockwork and the rapidity with which they introduced new tricks showed that they were not dependent upon any particular style of play. The forward pass was frequently resorted to by both sides, but where Wenatchee made miserable failures of their attempts, Oak Park carried the plays through with precision.

Cotter, left tackle; Ghee, quarter, Russell, right half and Rice, full-back, were the stars on the Oak Park team. None of the Wenatchee players showed to advantage.

The Chicago team started the game with a rush and would have scored in the first quarter but for the interference of the bell. Wenatchee held them in the first quarter and at the beginning of the second quarter, but soon gave way. The rest of the game was all Oak Park.

The crowd was the largest that ever attended a high school game in Seattle, and was the most disorderly that ever occupied the bleachers on Denny Field. As the one-sided game approached the end the spectators became more interested in the red apples distributed by the Wenatchee boosters who came on a special train and the crowd was soon in an uproar.

The student police of the University of Washington, who patrolled the situation, and the crowd broke into the field before the game was over. Oak Park had just made a touch down and the game was called eight minutes to go.

It was impossible to control the mob which had fallen to fighting among themselves, and Referee Varnell was unable to clear the field so that the goal could be kicked. After fruitless attempts Oak Park finally waived its right and accepted the game at 22 to 0, with the quarter only half over. Both Wenatchee and Seattle people did everything in their power to clear the gridiron but the game was hopelessly Chicago's.
