Churches and Their Work in 1910.

I have been asked to make a short review of church conditions in this city. I am not one who is addicted to statistics, for business purposes, they are no doubt necessary, but I find they are very deceptive in regard to a true spiritual valuation. I recall the words of a venerable bishop speaking about church growth, "It matters little," he said, "whether this church of ours becomes large numerically, what is important is that we keep the faith."

The point he stressed was that principle must never be sacrificed to gain numbers. As far as my observation goes, all the religious bodies represented here exhibit a growth in numbers and a general advance in a material way. Some have made substantial improvements in their working plant, while others are planning for new churches or parish buildings in the near future, as such have become necessary.

But each regards this material progress as the outward visible sign of an inward and spiritual one. Each in its own way has endeavored to strengthen such as do stand, to comfort and help the weak-bearded, to raise up those that fall, and to convert the erring. While none has accomplished probably all that was hoped for, yet each has cause to look gratefully on the past and encouragingly and confidently to renewed effort to strengthen the stakes and
