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SPOKANE AWAITS NEW REGIME

COMMISSION FORM OF GOVERNMENT TO BE TRIED.

New Charter Provisions Will Be Ratified on March Seventh.

Spokane, Wash., Jan. 4. (Special).—There will be more than 100 candidates, including Mayor Nelson S. Pratt, J. Oscar Peterson, city treasurer, George W. Armstrong, president of the board of public works; E. V. Lambert, president of the city council; Charles M. Fassett, president of the Spokane Chamber of Commerce, nine members of the city council, and bankers, merchants and tradesmen, for five commissionships under the new charter, which carried by a majority of 2,225. The election will take place on March 7, 1911, the commission taking charge of the city's affairs as soon as the vote is certified. The salary is \$5,000 a year and three of the commissionships are for terms of four years. The charter provides for first, second and third choice, which gives promise of complicating matters to make it one of the most spectacular campaigns in the history of the Northwest. Charles W. Flemming, city clerk, announces that any person may become a candidate by obtaining the names of 25 bona fide electors. There is no charge for filing.

GOVERNMENT LOSES LIBEL CASE

United States Supreme Court Upholds Lower Court's Action in Case.

Washington, Jan. 3.—The Supreme Court of the United States ruled against the government in the libel case against the New York World. The court upheld the ruling of the lower courts in quashing the indictments on the grounds that the federal courts had no jurisdiction. Roosevelt brought action in the case, after the paper published the story concerning the alleged graft in the Panama Canal bond sale. Roosevelt's brother-in-law, Douglas Robinson, was mentioned.

Accused by Government.

Pendleton, Jan. 4.—The Live Wire said yesterday: Douglas Belts, reputed to be one of the largest holders of land in Umatilla county and a well-respected resident of Pilot Rock, will tomorrow morning face a federal court and jury in Portland, on a charge of illegally fencing 320 acres of government land. It was on October 21 last that Douglas Belts was accused and information filed by United States District Attorney McCourt. At that time it was said a prosecution was not expected to follow as the government would endeavor to recover the land.

Proceedings Open Tomorrow.
This has proved not to be the case and the proceedings will open in Portland tomorrow morning.

Colonel J. R. Raley will defend Mr. Belts and will be assisted by Judge Fee.

It is said that Mr. Belts has a perfect defense and that the land he is accused of fencing illegally is owned by him. That the charge is one inspired by gossip, it is said.
