TURNOVER TO NEW TREASURER MADE THIS WEEK.

FUNDS ARE NEEDED.

Legislature Asked to Supply Money for Checking of Disease in the State. Salem, Ore., Jan. 5.—The State Board of Health will, within the next few days, submit its report for the biennial period ending September 30, 1910. The board prefaced its annual report in the following language which would indicate that former assemblies of the legislature have not been doing full justice to the department:

"If the claim of all political economists that the health, well-being and bodily vigor of its citizens is the greatest asset of a community is true, we feel that we are engaged in what is the most important and useful work in the state and it is with a sense of satisfaction that we call your attention to the results which have been accomplished with the entirely inadequate means which have been placed at our disposal. The entire sum allowed us with which to carry on the work in a territory of some 94,500 square miles with a population of 672,705 people is but \$5,000 a year which averages about 7-10 of 1 cent to be expended in a period of one year for each inhabitant of the state and appropriation so utterly inadequate to the purpose as to call for no comment.

"The summary and comment contained in this report is not submitted in a spirit of criticism, but is offered with a view of instilling your interest in an important subject and by the way of explanations to those engaged in similar lines of work in other states of the serious handicap under which we have labored as a board of health, the amount of money allowed for such work being less than that perhaps in any other state in the Union."

Dependency upon other states during the past two years by borrowing that which Oregon requires for the maintenance of the public health should be remedied by the legislature this year, is suggested. The board says that this state has no means by which it can manufacture vaccine, anti-toxine or serum, and the board has

been depending upon other states for these supplies heretofore. An appropriation of \$1500 for the improvement of the state's present laboratory is asked. According to the report, the fresh water streams in Oregon are badly polluted.

STANFIELD SUIT COMPROMISED

Robert Stanfield Secures Control of Land Included in Townsite.

That the suit brought by R. N. Stanfield against Dr. W. H. Coe and others to foreclose a mortgage he holds upon town property at Stanfield has been settled by a compromise is the substance of a story from Portland. The following is from a story published yesterday in the Oregon Journal.

"A compromise effected late this afternoon, practically removes a legal handicap, which temporarily, has retarded the progress of the town of Stanfield in western Umatilla county. Within a year this town has developed from sagebrush land to a municipality with 500 inhabitants, enjoying many modern conveniences.

"A few weeks ago Robert Stanfield, former owner of the townsite, began a legal action against Dr. Henry W. Coe, the head of the Columbia Land Co., to foreclose a \$55,000 mortgage on the townsite and land embracing 420 acres. The institution of these proceedings disarranged all development of the Stanfield irrigation project.

"When the suit was filed about two-thirds of the lots of the original plat of the town comprising 70 acres of land, had been disposed of by Dr. Coe and a small portion of acreage tracts adjoining the townsite had been transferred to newcomers. Robert Stanfield originally had a selling arrangement with Dr. Coe for the disposition of the lots in the townsite on a commission basis, and Mr. Stanfield released all lands sold under this agreement.

About a year ago Dr. Coe for the Columbia Land company, purchased the remaining town lots and all of the acreage tracts lying adjacent, including in all about 400 acres. Only a partial payment was made on this purchase, and for alleged failure to perform the specific details of this sale, the foreclosure was begun.

"By the terms of the agreement, Robert Stanfield again secures control of all the land embraced in the original sale and a new selling company will succeed to the rights formerly enjoyed by the Columbia Land company with Dr. Coe at its head.
