ZERO WEATHER TEST SOUGHT

CONTRACTORS ON BIG BUILDING COMPLETE WORK.

Small Amount of Payments Held Out Awaiting Finishing Touches.

A large amount of detail matters was transacted by the school board at a meeting last evening. In the first place a large number of bills, some of them large ones were ordered paid. Among these were warrants in favor of Bartlet, the contractor who has practically completed the school building. There is yet some cement work to be done but it cannot be consistently arranged during the cold weather and a balance is held out of the final payment to await satisfactory completion of the work when warmer weather arrives. This includes some finishing touches to the walls and on the roofing as well. The work will remove the roughness noticeable around the windows at the present time.

Contractor Sutherland who put in the heating plant was paid off with the exception of ten per cent held out until a test of the plant can be made. According to the contract it must be 10 below zero before Sutherland gets all his money. The plant is guaranteed to stand a test of that degree of cold and unless the mercury drops that low this year, the contractor cannot draw his balance due according to the contract. Other arrangements may then be made however.

Equipment for the manual training department was ordered selected and purchased at the meeting.
 H. N. Peach has been officially installed as janitor of the new building, a job that requires considerable experience.

LAYING NEW RAILS.

Big Undertaking near Pendleton is Well Under Way.

With a work train and a gang of rail layers, the last part of the million and a quarter dollar improvement work undertaken by the O-W company nearly a year ago was begun out of this city this morning. Under the direction of L. C. McCoy, who is assistant under Chief Engineer Boesche, the work of distributing the rails along the twelve miles of track will be accomplished within a few days, after which the actual laying of the rails will be in, says the Pendleton East Oregonian.

McCoy is the man who has charge of the laying of the rails on the Deschutes road and he is assisted in his work by George T. Ross. The grading work, which was let by contract to Thoby Bros., is now completed between Pendleton and Yonkum and when the rails are laid, the distance between this city and Portland will be cut-down two miles and many grades will be reduced and curves eliminated.

The work train began work this morning at the Walters' mill where ten miles of 90-pound rails have been stored for some time. Just how long a time will be required to complete this part of the big improvement work is difficult to say but will depend largely on the size of the force of men employed.
