FINDS CAMPS IN HEALTHY STATE

OFFICIAL TOUR OF INSPECTION REVEALS GOOD CONDITIONS

Lone Case of Small Pox Infected at Haines is Supposition.

Finding that there are no indications of contagion in the lumber camps along the Grande Ronde river in the north end of the county, Dr. N. Molitor, county health officer, returned late last evening from a thorough tour of inspection of all the camps in that vicinity. The official inspection was instigated by the case of small pox reported to have been transmitted to Ike Warnstaff in a camp near the mouth of the Grande Ronde a few days ago. The trip divulged the fact that Warnstaff was inoculated at Haines where there are several cases to date, and that he had been at the particular camp for a few days. During that time two had been exposed but the health officer found them to be immune. As a precautionary measure Dr. Molitor vaccinated about thirty lumbermen in that vicinity, though he is confident that the Warnstaff case is the only one in that region and that there is no danger of others taking the dreaded disease. Warnstaff was moved away before the disease "broke out."
