RUSK FORCES IN FIGHT

PRELIMINARY SKIRMISH INDICATES HOW WIND BLOWS.

Many Bills Introduced in House Before Adjournment Yesterday.

Salem, Jan. 11 (Special)—A battle royal between the Eaton and Rusk forces which, if won by the Eaton contingent, will make it impossible for the speaker to deliver the goods promised in exchange for the votes of Thompson men that helped elevate Rusk to the chair, had its beginning this morning in committee and was carried to the floor of the house this afternoon, says a Salem report.

The Eaton adherents deny emphatically that their attitude in relation to the employment of common clerks or committee appointments is due to a thirst for revenge and contend that they are imbued solely by a desire to lighten the burdens of taxpayers and preserve fair play. Unquestionably if they win in the struggle, the state treasury will be benefitted to the extent of thousands of dollars.

When the house was called to order this morning Speaker Rusk announced this committee on clerk hire, the members being selected from districts in numerical order, after he had appointed Irving L. Mann, son of Representative Mann, Dean Curtis and Eugene Houston as pages for the session. The committee follows: Libby, Eaton, Miller, Huntington, Rackleff, Pierce, Smith, Egghinton, Buchanan, (chairman) Bonebrake, Powell, Chambers, Brownhill, Beals, Hollis, Jones, Chatten, Bryant, Halland, Miller, Thompson, Mahoney, Mann, Rusk, McKinney, Church, Brooke, Buckley and Gill.

The committee met in the governor's office when the house adjourned at 11 o'clock and for some time wrestled with the proposition of whether the chairman of the committee should appoint the common clerks and stenographers for the session or whether each employe should be elected by the committee as a body. Eaton's strength proved too strong and the committee adjourned without definite action being taken.

Subsequent to the inaugural proceedings this afternoon Eaton is to introduce in the house the resolution which means war between the rival factions.

State Capitol, Salem, Or., Jan. 11.—By a strict partisan vote, the forces aligned with Speaker Rusk won a decisive victory over the Eaton followers this morning in the first sharp skirmish between the rival factions. The vote was on a motion to table the report of the subcommittee on clerkships and other house employes, recommending the appointment of separate messengers to carry bills between the house and the senate and the house and state printer's office and on a subsequent motion to assign such duties to one messenger. The Eaton men were beaten by a vote of 38 to 19 with four members absent and one not voting.

At the formal opening of the morning session the committee on clerks reported that it had met and organized, with Buchanan of Douglas and Jackson as chairman and Bryant of Multnomah as secretary. The former voted for Thompson as speaker and the latter for Rusk. A subcommittee to appoint clerks, stenographers and other employes were named—McKinney of Baker, chairman and Smith, Jones, Bryant and Mann. All are Rusk supporters except Smith, who voted for Eaton.

The subcommittee reported in favor of adopting the resolution for the appointment of a messenger to carry bills between the house and the state printer's office, with an amendment to reduce the salary from \$4 to \$3 a day, and the resolution for the appointment of another messenger to carry bills between the house and senate, with an amendment reducing the salary from \$5 to \$4 a day. The clash came on motion of Smith to table the report with the suggestion that the same messenger be required to carry bills from the house to the senate and the state printer's office. The suggestion was later embodied in a motion to that effect.

In addition to downing the Eaton stalwarts when it came to a question

of strength, the Rusk men outgeneraled their opponents today. It was known that the special committee of three on rules of which Eaton is chairman, intended recommending that all members of house committees be elected by it as a body, instead of receiving appointment from the speaker.

House Acts on Resolutions.

State Capitol, Salem, Or., Jan. 11.—Favorable action was taken by the house immediately before adjournment today on the following:

H. R. 2, authorizing the speaker to appoint a stenographer to attend to his correspondence.

H. R. 15, reducing the salary of the messenger to the state printer's office from \$4 to \$3 a day.

H. R. 16, instructing the Secretary of State to supply every member with 250 2-cent and 100 1-cent stamps; with an amendment providing that the sergeant-at-arms be supplied with 100 2-cent and 100 1-cent stamps and the mailing clerk with 300 2-cent stamps for the performance of their official duties.

H. R. 15, reducing the salary of the messenger between the house and the senate \$5 to \$4 a day.

H. R. 18, instructing the Secretary of State to supply members of the house with copies of the senate and house journals for the session of 1909.

H. R. 22, inviting ministers of the gospel to open the house morning session with prayer.

H. R. 23, notifying the Secretary of State to supply members with five daily papers, such papers to be selected by the individual legislators.

H. R. 28, providing that the makeup of the house calendar for the 26th biennial session shall be the same as that of the calendar for the 25th session.

The following, including H. R. 28, which was acted on at once, as specified in the foregoing, were introduced at this morning's session:

H. R. 27, by Nener of Douglas—Requires that all bills amending the code shall refer to Lord's Oregon Laws, instead of to Bellinger and Cotton's Annotated Codes, and that such as have been introduced and do not comply with this provision shall be amended by the judiciary committee.

H. R. 29, by Clyde—Forbids the introduction of any bill less than five days previous to adjournment. The resolution states that the house places itself on record as being opposed to machine politics and the railroadng of bills.

H. R. 30, by Mariner, of Gilliam, Sherman and Wheeler—Instructs the sergeant-at-arms to deliver to the State Library Commission 10 copies of all bills introduced for filing and for exchange with other legislative assemblies now in session.

H. R. 31, by Clemens—Orders the Secretary of State to supply forthwith a drinking tank to be located in the house chamber which shall be filled daily with boiled water.

GALES SWEEPING ENGLAND AND GERMANY

SEVERAL SHIPS ASHORE AS RESULT OF HEAVY WINDS.

Shipping at a Standstill—Loss of Life at Sea Thought to be Heavy.

London, Jan. 12.—Heavy gales are sweeping the eastern coast of England and all shipping is suspended. A number of vessels are reported to be wrecked or ashore. Communication with Calais, France, is lost. The Brazilian steamer Flores, enroute to Hamburg, is ashore at Walmer. The steamer Bushill is ashore, the schooner Fox is wrecked at Fishguard, and the steamer Shelby is stranded near Rotterdam. A number of buildings were blown down in this city and a number of people injured. There was probably a loss of life at sea.
