



SIDE BY SIDE IN DEATH

SAD EXPERIENCE OF WOMAN IN PENDLETON.

Went to Attend Funeral of Son—Husband Dies.

The bodies of William H. Lyman and Charles B. Lyman, father and son lie side by side in the Folsom undertaking parlors today, says a Pendleton paper. Death claimed the former yesterday afternoon while the latter passed away this morning about 8 o'clock.

It was while speeding from his home in California, to the bedside of his dying son in this city, that the parent, who was 70 years of age, passed away on the train just below Arlington yesterday afternoon. Though heart failure is given as the immediate cause of the demise it is said that the fear that he would not see his son alive combined with the strain of the long journey made him ill and during a great part of the trip he was irrational.

He was accompanied by his aged wife, Mary M. Lyman, who was prostrated by his death and rendered almost helpless. The body was taken off the train at Arlington and the train was held there for several minutes until the train men could learn from the woman her destination.

William Lyman was born in Springfield, Missouri, and in addition to his wife is survived by one daughter and four sons. These are Mrs. McMillan, of Oakland, California, with whom the aged couple made their home; Lib Lyman of Oakland; Frank Hart and William Lyman, all of Springfield, Missouri.

Charles B. Lyman, the fifth son, who for ten years has been a prominent and well known resident of Pendleton, died this morning at the family apartments on East Court street, after an illness of several months with Bright's disease. For the past seven or eight years he has conducted the Lyman market on East Court street.

He was born in Springfield, Missouri, 42 years ago and is survived by a wife and three children, Irene, Marie and Eugene, all of this city.

The deceased was a member of the Woodmen of the World and of the Knights of Pythias. Both of these orders will participate in the funeral services which will be conducted Thursday afternoon at 2:30. Interment will be in Olney cemetery.

The elder Lyman was a major in the civil war, a prominent member of the Oakland post of the G. A. R. and his body will be shipped to Springfield, Missouri, for interment. Members of the local post will escort the body to the train.

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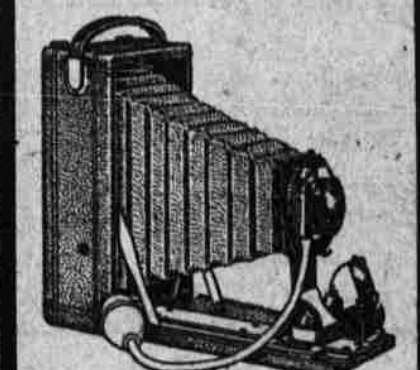
