MANIFOLD DUTY OF LEAGUE

UNION COUNTY TAXPAYERS' LEAGUE IS DESCRIBED.

Rules and By-Laws of That Associa- tion Published in Full.

What is the Union County Taxpay-
ers' League? This question has been
asked time and time again by citizens
of Union county since the association
was organized last summer, and

though answers have been in a gen-
eral way, correct, the actual purpose
of the association has not been fully
divulged for the by-laws have never
been published in detail. In response
to a general request to that end, the
Observer reproduces the by-laws and
general laws of the association as
follows:

Constitution of the Union County Tax- payers' League.

For the purpose of co-operating
and assisting in the economical ad-
ministration of the finances of Union
county, Oregon, apprising the finan-
cial agents thereof of improper
claims, and more fully performing
the duty of citizen in such matters,
and thereby lessening the burdens of
taxation, we organize and constitute
ourselves a Taxpayers' League, and
adopt this constitution.

ARTICLE I.

The Name of League.—The name
assumed and by which this league
shall be known, shall be The Union
County Taxpayers' League.

ARTICLE II.

Membership.—Each taxpayer of
Union County, Oregon, shall be eli-
gible for membership in this organi-
zation.

ARTICLE III.

Senate.—There shall be elected
from the taxpayers of the County of
Union, Oregon, who have signed the
roll of membership, twelve men, who
shall be known as the senate.

ARTICLE IV.

Duties of Senate.—It shall be the
duty of the senate to carry out the
purpose of this league, and they
shall have power to originate and
carry out all matters of policy sub-
ject to the approval or direction of
the body of membership when called
together as hereinafter provided.

ARTICLE V.

Elections.—Four members of the
senate shall be elected by a majority
of the members present at the regu-
lar annual meeting of the League,
which shall be held in La Grande,
Oregon, on the first Saturday of Octo-
ber, of each year, and shall hold
their office until their successors are
chosen. But not over three mem-
bers of the senate shall be elected
from the same incorporated town or
precinct.

ARTICLE VI.

Officers of Senate.—Within ten
days after the election of the mem-
bers of the Senate they shall at such
time and place as shall be named
by the retiring president, meet and
organize, by electing from their num-
ber, a President, Vice President, and
Secretary-Treasurer. For the year
1910, the presiding officer of the
meeting of taxpayers shall appoint
such time and place.

ARTICLE VII.

Duties of Officers.—It shall be the
duty of the President, or in his ab-
sence, the Vice President, to call all
meetings of the Senate to order, and
preside, to appoint all committees,
and perform such other duties as
pertain to this office; and on request
of . . . members of the League, he
shall call members together at the
County seat within ten days after
such request in writing is made to
him.

It shall be the duty of the Secre-
tary-Treasurer to keep record of all
meetings of the Senate and League
when assembled, to receive and ac-
count for all funds that may be col-
lected or paid into his hands, to issue
notices to members, and to perform
such other duties as usually pertain
to this office, under the direction of
the President.

ARTICLE VIII.

Committees.—There shall be the
following Standing Committees, who
shall be appointed by the President
at the beginning of each year from
the members of the Senate: A Com-
mittee of Public Roads, a Committee
on Public Expenditures, and a Com-
mittee on Taxation; and whenever
deemed advisable by the senate, the
President shall appoint such special
committees for investigation or
other business as may seem proper.
Each committee shall consist of three
persons.

ARTICLE IX.

The Duties of Committees.—It
shall be the duty of the Committee
on Public Roads to examine into and
report to the Senate the needs and
requirements of the county for pub-
lic roads and bridges, and investi-
gate any and all extravagant or im-
proper bills presented to the County
Court for such work, and report
thereon to the Senate.

It shall be the duty of the Com-
mittee on Public Expenditure to exam-
ine into the finances of the county, the
receipts and disbursements thereof
and the purpose therefor, the amount

of salaries paid and such other ex-
penditures as are made and report
thereon to the Senate.

The Committee on Taxation shall
investigate and report upon any omis-
sions of property from the tax rolls
to the end that all property may be
assessed equitable and uniformly.

Other committees shall investigate
and report to the Senate upon the
questions assigned them.

ARTICLE X.

Recommendations of Senate.—The
Senate shall, after having fully in-
vestigated any matter and make such
action toward aiding, assisting and
curtailing any extravagances or un-
necessary expenditures of the county
that they may find, and make such
recommendations thereon as they
shall deem proper, to the proper au-
thorities, the League or the public
through the press. They may em-
ploy experts for the purpose of in-
vestigating any matter and pay them
out of the funds of the League. A
majority of the Senate present shall
be sufficient for any recommendation,
except in the event that it shall be
deemed advisable to recall any pub-
lic officer, then it shall require three-
fourths of all present to make such
recommendation.

ARTICLE XI.

By-Laws.—The League shall adopt
such by-laws at any meeting of the
members as shall be deemed neces-
sary; provided such by-laws shall be
adopted at the annual meeting or at
a meeting called for that purpose,
after ten days' notice in the press.

ARTICLE XII.

Amendments.—This constitution
may be amended at the annual meet-
ing, or at a special meeting called for
that purpose after ten days' notice,
by a majority of the members pres-
ent.
