He had an instinct for the dramatic effects which hold the attention of the mob. 'When the poll is declared I shall be there,' he exclaimed, according to a Wycombe tradition, pointing to the head of the llon, 'and my opponent will be there,' pointing to the tail. By the admission even of the opplete success, and his popularity with the crowd was thenceforth assured."

As to the young orator's appearance at Taunton. Mr. Monypenny gathers these comments of an eyewitness from an almost forgotten book of that time: "Never in my life had I been so struck by a face as I was by that of Disraeli. It was lividly pale, and from beneath two finely arched eyebrows blazed out a pair of intensely black eves. I never have seen such orbs in mortal sockets either before or since.




