Coal Merchants to be Represented at State Grocer's Convention.

La Grande merchants will be represented at the state meeting of the Oregon Grocer's association at Salem. J. G. Snodgrass and E. Polack are some of the local members of the state association who contemplate leaving for Salem tomorrow. Low rates have been provided for the merchants of Oregon who wish to attend. John Collier, for several years a vice president and member of the board of directors of the state association, may not attend this year. The credentials for the delegates who wish to go can be provided at the secretary's desk of the Merchants' Protective Association office.

BUILD ROAD SHADE TREES

Multnomah County to Pattern After Europe in This Respect.

Portland, Ore., Jan. 23 (Special)—Multnomah county will pattern after Europe in the matter of beautifying its roads. Ten thousand shade trees

will be planted along the sides of country roads, a portion of the county poor farm being utilized as a nursery for growing the young saplings until they reach a size suitable for transplanting.

An order was made by the County Court authorizing the purchase of seed of such trees as will grow best in this locality and they will be planted as soon as possible. E. H. Wempe, president of the Portland Automobile club, appeared before the county court to urge this action and he found ready support from County Judge Cleton who made the order.

"In Europe," said Mr. Wempe, "tourists travel long distances to see the famous roads, which are nothing but country roads with trees planted on both sides of them. The country about Portland is the most beautiful in the world. Only the beautification of our roads has been neglected. The expense would be slight and the returns very great. We can have the beautiful highways as any in the older countries, and Multnomah county will benefit from the added attractiveness."

"I believe thoroughly in the plan said Judge Cleton. "It seems to me that the beautification of our roads is, in a sense, almost as important as their improvement."

The nursery is to be fixed in a convenient corner of the poor farm property. It will be selected in a few days and seed of several varieties of shade trees planted so that the work of beautifying Multnomah county driveways may be commenced at the earliest possible time.
