"Honey Moon Trail"

Those whose views incline toward pessimism seem to think that musical comedy is on the wane. The "wise-acre" who talks of things theatrical, and he is legion, has loudly voiced his sentiments during the past two or three seasons to the effect that "the public will soon tire of girl shows and music shows and go back to the old style of entertainment which it formerly patronized so extensively." The shrewdest managers in the theatrical business, however, are pinning their faith on musical comedy as strongly this season as they have since this style of entertainment has been a furore, and the men who talk with capital, and not with words alone, are saying nothing, but are making the same gorgeous productions as heretofore. The number of standard and Shakespearean attractions on tour remains extremely low.

The American public demands entertainment--clever, clean entertainment--and the producing manager, to meet this demand, produces an attraction, the component elements of which are music, lights, color and action. To this must be added another essential--comedy.

It is doubtful if any musical comedy now on tour in this country combines in such a high degree the essentials of musical comedy success than does "Honey Moon Trail," the record-breaking Hough, Adams and Howard musical masterpiece from the La Salle Theatre, Chicago, which, with a company of over half a hundred "post graduate fun-makers" appears at the Steward tonight.

WILL SOON SHIP ORE.

Mines at Joseph to Begin Their Production, According to Herald.

Mr. Dunn of Portland, general freight agent of the O-W. R. & N., spent a couple of days in town this week making arrangements to ship ore from our numerous mines to the smelters at Tacoma and Salt Lake City. The rate he gave our mine owners is very satisfactory, and is expected that the shipment of ore--several cars a day--will begin within a few weeks from the Lead Mountain, Co. King, Mountain Gem, Transwahl and other properties.

Mr. Dunn assures our people that it is the intention of his company to build a branch line or spur from Joseph to the foot of Middle Mountain above the Lake this spring. The mountain is about ten miles distant from the town. This will be in close proximity to half a dozen or more of our leading mines and will greatly reduce the expense of ore shipment.

It will also cause as pretty a little mining boom as you ever heard of in this or any other man's country.

DOCTORS VIEW THE SITES

SPECIAL COMMITTEE FROM SALEM VISITS PENDELTON

Drops in on the Town Unannounced and Inspects the Sites There.

Pendleton, Jan. 24--The Pendleton East Oregonian said yesterday:

For the purpose of inspecting the site purchased for the eastern Oregon branch hospital with a view to making recommendations as to the location of the buildings the committee appointed by Governor West, has been here today. The committee is composed of Dr. Andrew C. Smith, Dr. Harry Lane, Dr. W. F. Williamson, Dr. J. F. Calbraith and John H. Lewis, state engineer. The committee has been busy the greater part of the day viewing the various proposed sites and the members will advise the eastern Oregon tonight.

Arriving here on the early morning train from Portland today, the members of the committee took local people entirely by surprise. No advance notice of their coming had been sent out and it was not until they reached here that local people had any knowledge of their coming. Early during the forenoon, however, preparations were made for taking the visitors to the site in autos and they were soon viewing the land purchased by the state board. During the forenoon several hours were spent in going over the Oliver Carpenter ranch and an inspection of the building site, the McDaniels place, a short distance below the Oliver ranch.

Entertained at Luncheon. At 12:30 the members of the visiting party were entertained at luncheon at the Hotel Pendleton by members of the Commercial club board of managers. Aside from the members of the managing board several other local men attended the luncheon. At the conclusion of the same the members adjourned to the office of Dr. C.

J. Smith where a short consultation was held.

This afternoon the committeemen are being shown the Cheney-Clopton ranch which was also submitted as a proposed site for the branch hospital.

To Hold Joint Session.

Thus far there has been no meeting between the members of the government to represent the senate SHRDLUUU or its committee and the members of the committee appointed recently to represent the senate and house of representatives. However Dr. Andrew C. Smith intimated today that a joint conference of the two committees will be held after the legislators have inspected the sites. By the holding of a joint conference the best results can be obtained, in the view of Dr. Smith. "There has been enough hair splitting over this matter and it is time for the people to get together," said the doctor speaking upon this point.
