### APPLE UNION PLANNED

#### GROWERS MEET TO DISCUSS FUTURE ACTION.

#### Regulation of Sales Declared Necessary in View of Gain.

Portland, Jan. 25—Steps looking toward the control of the market for the entire apple crop of the west were taken at the opening session of a three day conference of growers at the Y. M. C. A. yesterday. Plans are under way for forming an organization which will have charge of handling an annual harvest which runs up into the tens of millions of dollars. More than 200 delegates to the convention are already here and more are coming. They represent the six leading apple-growing states of the west, Oregon, Washington, Idaho, Utah, Colorado and Montana. While only a portion of the delegates who will be here have registered, the following communities were represented:

Washington—Woodland, Felida, Yakima, Wenatchee, White Salmon, Ridgefield, Walla Walla, Spokane, Cashmere, Clarkston, Tacoma, Seattle, Prosser, Goldendale.  
Idaho—Weiser, Boise, Lewiston.  
Oregon—Gaston, Marshfield, McMinnville, Hood River, Salem, La Grande, Medford, Eugene, Albany.  
Utah—Dufur Valley, Canby, Escudado, Forest Grove, Hillsboro, Sutherlin, Mosier, Newberg.

The meeting called by President Atwell of the Oregon State Horticultural Society, for the creation of an apple co-operative selling agency company, will be held in the Y. M. C. A. assembly hall Tuesday says the Portland Oregonian. The call includes six states—Washington, Idaho, Oregon, Utah, Colorado and Montana. Leading apple-growers from the various orchard districts will be present.

Among those scheduled to take part in the proceedings are Daniel E. Willard of St. Paul, development agent of the Northern Pacific Railway company; Fremont Wood, of Boise, Idaho, judge of the third judicial district of Idaho; Miles Cannon, of Weiser, Idaho, prominent apple grower; E. F. Benson, of Prosser, Wash., president of the Washington State Horticultural Society and C. E. Whistler, of Medford, Ore., prominent fruit-grower of southern Oregon.

The object of the association is to "protect the apple market primarily from indiscriminate dumping of products without due consideration of the opportunities presented by gradual distribution of the crop over a period of time, thus permitting the demand to be held in control so that remunerative prices may be obtained."

It is proposed to form a company with sufficient paid up capital to create distributing centers in the various large cities of the east, coupled with ample storage plants to hold the crop and care for it, and through agents to market the product of the mountain and coast states in such a manner as will permit slumping of the prices. It is conceded by the fruitgrowers behind the movement that the undertaking is a large one, but they believe it is one that can be handled in a practical manner to the advantage of all of the apple-growers. The company is not to be organized with a view to profit for the promoters, but for the advantage of individual members in marketing of their apples.

It is pointed out that the quantity of new apple trees coming into bearing for the first time in 1911 will equal the number of trees already in bearing, virtually doubling the crop of the northwest.

It is likely that the meeting will last several days. Consultation is to be had with lawyers, familiar with the drawing of incorporation papers of co-operative companies in California, where success has met the efforts of the raisin and orange growers.

Delegates have been selected by the fruit unions and local co-operative companies at Hood River, Yakima, Weiser, Idaho; Walla Walla, Goldendale, Medford, Albany, Eugene, Boise and other districts.

### Mrs. MacLennan at San Diego

#### Meets Brother After Long Separation at Southern California.

The story of an interesting meeting of brother and sister is told by the San Diego Sun in reference to the arrival there of Mrs. Kate MacLennan who lived in La Grande for some time, and who is the mother of Miss MacLennan, the nurse, now living in La Grande. The story is told in the following from the Sun.

Few people have the experience of meeting a brother or sister after a separation of more than 30 years, and fewer still have met a brother or sister and passed on without a sign of recognition, but that was the experience of Lawrence A. Creelman, former president of the city council and harbor commissioner and his sister, Mrs. Kate MacLennan of Toronto, Canada, at the Grant hotel yesterday.

Thirty-one years ago Creelman and Mrs. MacLennan parted at their home in Canada, where they had grown from childhood. Although both have returned to the old home many times, neither has seen the other since that time.

A few days ago Mrs. MacLennan came to San Diego to visit with relatives. With Mrs. J. A. Creelman she visited the Grant hotel yesterday and while standing in the lobby met Mr. Creelman. The former councilman greeted his sister-in-law and talked at his side. Neither sister nor brother recognized each other, and after a short talk both parted. Then Creelman was called back, and sister and brother were introduced.

Mrs. MacLennan has three brothers here, J. A. Creelman, Fred Creelman and L. A. Creelman. None of the brothers has seen her for more than 20 years and all have changed greatly in that time. She will spend the winter here, and may locate in this city, the home of her brothers.

**BAILEY WILL NOT RESIGN**  
Pure Food Official Denies He's a Graft.

"No thought of resigning has ever entered my head, and I certainly shall not retire under fire."

So declared State Dairy and Food Commissioner Bailey to a Portland newspaper this morning in referring to the pending grand jury investigation of his office affairs.

"This proceeding has been brewing for months, and is nothing more or less than the most abominable political conspiracy I ever heard of," continued Mr. Bailey. "I am accused of graft. If I wanted to be a crook, do you think it would be necessary to be a 10-cent skater when there was more than \$2000 in the pure-food fund that I could have used at my own pleasure and in any way I saw fit?"

"I have been ready to appear at any time before the current grand jury, and District Attorney Cameron knows it. When I talked with the office a few days ago over the phone and asked if I was wanted I was told that they were not ready for me at that time. Then I requested that the grand jury visit my office, where all the records are. The jurors didn't come."
