FARNER IS SENTENCED

Given Five Years in Penitentiary After Retrial is Denied by Court.

Following arguments for a new trial in the Jess Parker murder case yesterday afternoon, Judge J. W. Knowles ruled that no new trial should be granted, and at 1 o'clock sentenced Parker to five years in the penitentiary for killing his father-in-law, William Foster at Elgin.

The case will be appealed to the supreme court on grounds that there was no evidence which would materially change the defense in the case.

For about twenty-four hours while bond money was being secured, Parker was kept in the county jail, but his bonds were filed this afternoon at a late hour.

Whites, 655,610; negroes, 1,526; Indians, 5,001; Chinese 7,317; Japanese 3,286 and others, 25. Umatilla county has 20,309; Baker 18,077; Union 16,194 and Douglas, 19,674.
