## COVE CAPTURES CONTEST

FLOOR SERIOUS HANDICAP AND LOCALS LOSE GAME.

Fast Men Comprise Cove Team—Coming Here in February.

By the decisive score of 41 to 24 Cove high defeated the La Grande high school team Saturday night at Cove in a game made slow and rough by a slippery floor. During the first half the youngsters from the local school were successful in keeping nearly abreast with their opponents, the final score ending ten to twelve in Cove's favor, but while the visitors strived to make headway on the dance floor the Cove players used to situation were playing rings around them and throwing goals intermittently. La Grande was no match for the combination of strength presented by the Cove team. Four of the players are big strong fellows, with more than common ability, would make a splendid showing against any quintet. Kall, the big football shark who plays center and Roberts, the little forward of the Cove team constitute a formidable combination of basketballers and much as the La Grande players tried they could not match muscle and footwork with the home team.

Up until the last ten minutes the game progressed with no more roughness than follows a contrast between a big team and a light team but the finish wound up with a spurt of football tactics that not only enlivened the game but kept the spectators pitched to a high tension. Umpire Turner, a Cove man, who handled the referee's whistle in the second half was exceptionally fair in his decisions and La Grande came away well satisfied with the treatment accorded them by the official from Cove. The Cove coach has trained his players along intercollegiate rules, which provides for roughing it and that style of play worked a hardship on Cove for Mr. Turner called foul after foul on Cove, and the last ten points La Grande got was scored by Bolton in that manner.

### GRIM REAPER CALLS PIONEER

William Chambers Died Suddenly From Hemorrhage of the Brain.

William Genoung Chambers died at 7:30 last evening at his residence at Ninth and Campbell, after a short illness. Death was caused by a hemorrhage of the brain. He had been in his usual health until a few days ago and his death last night was unexpected.

Mr. Chambers was 84 years old, and is survived by a wife and three children, E. E. Chambers and Mrs. James Cavin of Baker, and Mrs. J. F. Phy of La Grande.

Mr. Chambers was one of the oldest and best known pioneers of Baker county. He came here in 1862 and has since made this his home. He was born in Buffalo, New York, August 20, 1827, and spent the early years of his life in the east. In 1849 he married Mary Elizabeth McIntyre in Michigan and they crossed the plains together in 1862. He was a miller by trade and was the first to establish a mill in this part of the state. He followed the work until 1904, when he suffered a stroke of paralysis. He recovered sufficiently to be able to be around most of the time and enjoyed visiting with friends and talking over pioneer days.—Baker Herald.

Mr. and Mrs. Phy went to Baker yesterday morning to attend the funeral of Mr. Chambers.

### FREAKS OF A RIVER.

A Stream So Crooked That It Double Crosses Itself.

There is a stream in Massachusetts called the North river. It starts in a pond near Hanson and runs to the sea at Scituate. It is ten miles by air line from Hanson to Scituate, and the river is forty miles long.

This river is probably the most remarkable body of water, barring the Dead sea, on this footstool and has stood more abuse and bad language than the Chicago river. When the tide is coming in the river runs upstream, and not only that, but the upper part of it, which is fresh water, also runs up, and the spectacle of a fresh water river beating it uphill is alone enough to call attention to itself. But there is much more to it than that.

The North river is noted for being the scene of the last Indian raid on the coast settlements. It is notable for having given birth to the ship Columbia, whose captain discovered and named the Columbia river, and was the first American vessel to circumnavigate the world. It is notorious for having suddenly changed its mind on its course on the night of Nov. 27, 1898, when it moved its mouth three miles to the northward, presented the town of Marshfield with a deep harbor, killed three men and converted about 200,000 acres of prime meadow land into a salt marsh.

But the chief thing about this river is its crookedness. This river is so crooked that it double crosses itself. If you don't believe it go and see. There is one place in Hanover where by making three loops the river moves toward the sea for a distance of almost fifty feet and meanders about for fifteen miles in doing it.—Boston Traveler.
