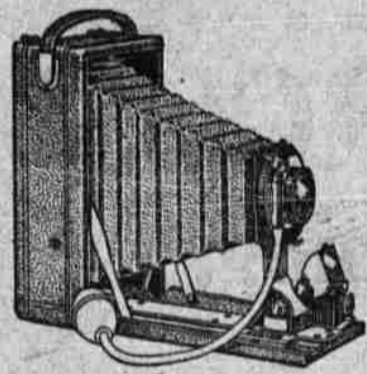

TRAVELS 63,856 MILES.

Rural Carrier out of Alice Established Freak Record in Eight Years.

Having traveled a distance equal to several times around the globe in carrying the United States mail on an Alice route, Willard F. Van Housen has established a record which few if any carriers in the service can duplicate. He has been in continual service for eight years this month losing only four days on account of sickness in his family. His wife, is his substitute and she supplied his place during his vacation. During this time he has covered 63,856 miles, nearly two and a half times around the earth. He has one horse which has stood him in good support. He estimates that this animal has been driven nearly if not quite, fifty thousand miles.

Two days during the eight years, saw the service blocked on account of bad roads, but otherwise, as constant as a clock Van Housen and his horse have traveled over the route and there is not a bump in the road or a rail in the fences that are not familiar to the veteran carrier. With this record Mr. Van Housen is unquestionably in a class by himself in this part of the state.
