JUAREZ, ITS POINTS.

A little town in Mexico has suddenly leaped into the limelight more strongly than it has ever had an opportunity to in Juarez. It has always been the home of bull fights—now it is the scene of a real battle. Dispatcher Wise, one of the men ticking the keys in the O-W office has lived in and about the little town for some time. He explains many important features about the city including that:

The town's real name is Ciudad Juarez, located directly across the Rio Grande river from El Paso, Tex. Three bridges span the river between the two towns, one of them a rail road bridge, two street car and wagon bridges. Juarez has a population of about 15,000, quite a few Americans holding interests in various kinds of business there. El Paso, Texas, is a growing city of about 45,000 population. Samalayuca is 29 kilometers south of Juarez in practically an open country and any trouble in that vicinity can be seen from the top stories of El Paso's 12 story buildings.

Huachuca is pronounced Wauchuca. Chihuahua, capital of the state of Chihuahua is pronounced Chewahawa.
