tions to be met will be ably fitted to carry out the duties. He commences his duties at once.

County stock inspection in this county is not so much how to prevent the spread of disease but to keep the health condition up to the stand it now holds. There is very few infectious diseases in this valley and the appointment of Dr. Charlton will tend in a large measure, to keep that desirable status on the records.
