GENERAL BARRY.

WESTPOINT'S new superintendent, Major General Thomas H. Barry, was one of the most popular cadets during the four years he was at the academy. As an athlete he stood in the front rank, and he stood high as a student. In June, 1877, he received his diploma and as a second lieutenant was assigned to the famous Seventh cavalry, Custer's old command. After three years in the Seventh General Barry was transferred to the infantry arm and assigned to the First Infantry as a first lieutenant. About two years later he was promoted, after that passing through every grade until in August, 1903, President Roosevelt made him a brigadier general. In April, 1908, the same president promoted him to his present rank, the highest under the present law that an army officer can attain.

Gabriele d'Annunzio, the famous Italian author and playwright, who is shortly to visit America, has a unique method of working. That nothing may disturb him he goes to the country house of his friend Michetti, the painter, and there in a large room he labors strenuously over his romances. No staircase leads to this room; neither has it any door. In the morning a ladder is placed against the window, and D'Annunzio climbs up and thus reaches his desk. Thereupon the ladder is removed by Michetti, and the novelist works at his ease until noon, when his friend climbs up to him with a light luncheon. The entire afternoon is also devoted to work, and not until evening does D'Annunzio descend the ladder.

Like other well known authors, D'Annunzio has found that fame has its penalties. At one time he was so bombarded with requests for his autograph that he was compelled to affix to the door of his residence the following notice: "Gabriele d'Annunzio, suffering from paralysis in the right hand, finds it utterly impossible to sign postcards and albums." Even this did not serve to damp the ardor of his admirers, for we are told that an English lady on reading the notice petulantly exclaimed, "Well, has he not got his left hand?"

It will surprise many to learn that W. A. Larned never really trains for his tennis matches. He eats what he craves, practices when he feels like it and never maps out any special plan. He plays tennis, he says, because he likes the game, and this is probably the reason why he is champion. His heart has been in his work on the courts during the twenty-one years he has been a tennis player.

When Larned defeated Bundy of California recently in the national championship match he won the title for the sixth time.

He first became a real factor in the American tennis world in 1900, when he won the all comers tournament. But M. D. Whitman retained his title when he met Larned in the challenge round. The next year, however, Larned came into his own.

After winning in the all comers class he won the national championship. In 1902 he defended it successfully, but the following year H. L. Doherty, the noted English player, won the title. For several years after that Larned was more or less inactive in the sport. Then in 1907 he flashed to the fore again, winning both the all comers and the championship in the challenge round from W. J. Clothier. The following year Larned disposed of Beals C. Wright, the challenger. W. J. Clothier was Larned's opponent last year, but the champion had little difficulty in defeating him.

One of those most frequently mentioned for the congressional speakership should Joseph G. Cannon be forced to retire from that office is Walter I. Smith of the Ninth Iowa district.

Mr. Smith has been a member of the house continuously since 1900. He was born at Council Bluffs in 1862 and has been a lawyer since 1882. From 1890 to 1900 he was judge of the Fifteenth judicial district. The caucus of delegates to the Iowa state convention from the Ninth district announced his candidacy for speaker of the next house.
