

Notice of Street Improvement.

To Whom it May Concern: Notice is hereby given that in pursuance of a resolution adopted by the Common Council of the City of La Grande, Oregon on the 15th day of December 1909, creating Improvement District No. 12, and designating Pennsylvania avenue, as such district, and in pursuance of a resolution adopted by said Common Council on the 18th day of January, 1911, whereby said Council determined and declared its intention to improve all that portion of Pennsylvania avenue, in said improvement district, as hereinafter described, by laying thereon Bitumastic pavement, the Council will, ten days after the service of this notice upon the owners of the property affected

and benefited by such improvement, order that said above described improvement be made; that the boundaries of said district to be so improved are as follows:

All that portion of Pennsylvania avenue, from the east side of 4th street to the west side of Washington avenue.

(A) And the property affected or benefited by said improvement is as follows:

The north half of blocks 63, 64, 65 and 66 and the south half of blocks 97, 98, 99 and 100 in Chaplin's Add. to La Grande, Oregon.

Notice is hereby further given that the Council will levy a special assessment on all the property affected and benefited by such improvement for

the purpose of paying for such improvement. That the estimated cost of such improvement is the sum of \$13,870.00. That the Council will on the 15th day of Feb. 1911, meet at the Council chamber at the hour of 8 o'clock p. m. to consider said estimated cost, and the levy of said assessment, when a hearing will be granted to any person feeling aggrieved by such assessment.

MORE LAND IS NEEDED

STATE ENGINEER LEWIS PRESENTS HIS OPINIONS.

Adjoining Tract Needed to Bound Out Site for Asylum at Pendleton

In his report to the committee of physicians appointed to investigate the eastern Oregon asylum site, State Engineer John H. Lewis makes the Roberts tract of 54 acres the strategic parcel of land, acquisition of which by the state, he appears to think, will justify the Bowerman purchases. He asserts that in any event it should be bought to round out the state's present holdings, to protect its interests in possible water power development, relates the Pendleton East Oregonian.

In relation to the Oliver tract, he described it as being largely bottom land, bounded by the Umatilla river on the south and by the bluffs on the north, along which runs the O-W. R. & N. line. This bottom land, he says is only a few feet above low water mark and subject to overflow in places at high water, but danger from this source can be avoided by building a dike. As all the low-water flow in the Umatilla river is entirely consumed, water for the irrigation of bottom lands not heretofore irrigated can only be secured during the spring floods, unless storage is supplied. Reservoirs for this purpose can be constructed in the mountains.

Lewis draws attention to the fact that the outlet of the Pendleton sewer enters the river just above this tract. While the Pendleton authorities have stated that they expect to extend this sewer to a point below the tract, the report emphasizes the non-existence of any executed agreement to this effect.

This condition would compel the state to extend the city sewer about one mile further down the stream if the city authorities failed to do so.

The only high ground on this tract available for a building site is represented to be north of the railroad and it is of restricted area because of a ravine which crosses the most desirable spot. This cove widens to the east and in the opinion of Mr. Lewis, if the Roberts tract of 54 acres were owned by the state, it would give a building site about 1,000 feet long and 200 feet in depth, with about 100 feet for lawn purposes. The ground rises about 25 feet in 200 feet distance and four test pits showed loose lava rock, 3 1-2, 7, 1 and 3 feet respectively below the surface, with indications of solid rock below.

The Wheeler tract of 320 acres optioned for purchase by the state at \$30 is described as being all bench and hill land, located down half a mile from the Oliver tract. After describing it in detail, Mr. Lewis reports as follows.

"Mr. Wheeler refused permission to dig test pits at the most probable building site. The Daniels tract of 220 acres adjoining the Wheeler place to the south, is said to be badly cut up by the river and railroad and only partially improved.

Being free from destructive floods and more valuable when irrigated than the bottom lands, reads the report, the Wheeler tract at \$30 an acre would be a good purchase if additional farm lands should be needed, even if not used as a building site. If used as a building site large areas, he says would be available for lawns, shrubbery and exercise grounds for the patients. A building also might be located at a bend in the river and afford a good view of Pendleton and of the valley looking down stream.
