Article Was Relative to the Case of Scarlet Fever at Savoy Hotel.

La Grande, Feb. 14 (To the Editor).—This morning's issue of the Morning Star, contains an article from the pen of one of editorial or reportorial staff that teems with absolute lies and misrepresentations regarding the action of the mayor and city physician with reference to the handling of the case of scarlet fever at the Savoy hotel. I was informed of the presence of this case about 4 p. m. Monday. I immediately took the matter up with Chief of Police Walden relative to finding a suitable place to remove the patient—all the efforts of the police department being unavailing during the afternoon, as the city does not own a pest house at the present time. At 7:30 p. m. I called up the city physician and together we visited the sick man at the Savoy hotel and after a discussion of the situation with Mr. Brichoux, we decided to allow him to remain in his room until morning when another effort would be made to secure a suitable place for him. For some unaccountable reason he was removed to the city jail about 9:30 p. m. without my knowledge, and I was so informed during the night by telephone. Unfortunately La Grande does not possess a quarantine station, although every effort has and is being made to acquire a suitable place for the above purpose.

The Star never investigates, but seems willing at all times to libel any city official that is making an honest effort under trying circumstances to do his duty. Why this malice?

NOTED DRIBBLER COMING HERE

TEAM THAT DEFEATED PORTAGE MATCHED AGAINST LOCALS

Will Introduce Fastest Dribblers in the World.

Arrangements providing the means of giving basketball fans a glimpse at the playing tactics of one of the fastest teams in the United States—defeaters of the crack Portage Wisconsin team, and now touring the west with a whirlwind success, were made this morning by Manager Neubauer of the High school quintet when the Hamilton basketball team of Two Harbors, Wis., was booked for one game next Saturday night. The contest will not be so much of a tussle to defeat the sharps from the basketball producing state, as it is to give the local fans an opportunity of seeing the best in the entire country at work. The team is brought here at some expense for the purpose of accommodating the fans. Though the game may be classed as signalized by its exhibition features, it will not be without a struggle for the high school five are buckling on a belt of determination to hold the team from Wisconsin down as far as possible. Some conception of their size is gained from the statements issued by their traveling manager, R. H. Suettinger, who is here today.

Players are Giants.

Their center is six feet three inches tall and has never met his equal; their forwards are considered by the experts to be the best and fastest dribblers in the world; one guard weighs 186 pounds and is known from coast to coast.

With playing mechanism that is well near perfect, the team will be a revelation for it is safe to predict that one in fifty who attend basketball games in this city have never seen what is known as perfection basketball. That opportunity will be afforded the fans next Saturday evening.

The contest will not only afford an opportunity of seeing exceptional class in basketball but it will pit the local lads against a team such as seldom visits this country and the lessons to be learned by such experience will stand them well in hand at later games.

Excitement is rife at the school today following the announcement of the game and efforts to make the best of the remaining hours for practices have already been extended. The very best possible work will be put in that the game may be as near even equality as possible. The high school is now and some clever playing will be the result.

PROMOTER "VAMMOSES."

Baker Authorities seek man Who Boomed Mining Property.

Lee Kaufman, erstwhile mining promoter, are now being sought by the officers of this city. It is charged that he took the cleanup from the Connor Creek mine and decamped with it. He left Huntington Friday night and is supposed to have gone to Boise but has not been located yet, says the Baker Herald.

Kaufman is quite well known in Baker, having spent much time here on various occasions. He has a bad record in police court, having been arrested and fined on an ugly charge.

In December he secured a lease on the old Connor Creek mine, from which several snug fortunes have been taken. Some rich ore was soon uncovered and the mine promised to again become a rich producer. He has had a force of men at work and they have been taking out good ore for several weeks. The mill was fixed up and ten stamps put in operation.

A hundred tons of rich ore was run through the mill and last week a clean up was made. Kaufman secured possession of the gold and last week traveled to Huntington, from where he caught an Eastbound train Friday night.

The mine is owned by the Reed estate of Portland and J. E. Sharp has been looking after its interests at the property. He was in Baker last week and it was during his absence from the property that Kaufman is said to have made the haul and got away with it. No criminal proceedings have been brought against him in the local court and it is not known what action the owners of the mine will take.

SPONGE FOUND IN WOMAN

PILOT ROCK LADY EXPERIENCES QUEER CONDITION

Previous Operation Leaves Pledge of Sponge in Woman's Side

To operate upon a woman for gallstones and find that the trouble was not caused by gallstones at all but by a sponge left in the body at the time of a previous operation was the experience of Portland doctors Saturday when they made an incision in the side of Mrs. Robert Manning of Pilot Rock, says the Pendleton East Oregonian. Mrs. Manning had been brought to this city by Dr. Fred Lienallen of Pilot Rock but her case was considered so serious that it was deemed advisable to take her to Portland where the operation with the above result was performed.

Mrs. Manning was operated upon a year ago last January by Dr. G. W. Cole of this city and evidently at that time the incision was sewed up without removing the sponge. For the benefit of the average person, it might be said that such a sponge consists of a piece of absorbent cloth about the size of a man's hand. Mrs. Manning has been suffering from this for some time but it was thought by doctors that she was afflicted with gallstones.

For one reason, they wished to devote their time during the session of congress, to other more pressing matters, such as the proposed reciprocity agreement with Canada, and the potash dispute with Germany. Another reason for the delay, hardly less potent, is that after congress adjourns, the president may appoint without thought of the senate. That body will probably not meet until December next, and thus his appointees may hold office in the diplomatic service for nearly a year before the Senate need be asked to confirm them. Once in, it is believed almost any appointee will be confirmed.
