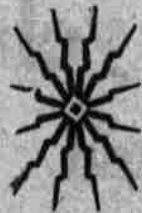

This undisputed skill in handling the

day night a decided popularity and it
is believed that the high school gym
will be crowded with interested fans
who anticipate, not so much to see
La Grande defeat the visitors as they
do to see the best aggregation on the
road at work. The Hamilton team has
done wonders.

Record This Season.

On December 3rd, 1910—this season
—the team, without ever practicing
or playing together, defeated the
championship Co. F team of Portage
23-19 on a neutral floor for the state
championship. The Portage team is
also touring the west and will express
their opinion as to the playing ability
of the Hamilton team.

The following clippings taken from
write-ups this season speak for them-
selves:

Last season the team played 12
games, 5 at home and 12 on outside
floors.

The record for 12 games:
Hamilton total No. points 528
Opponents total No. points 264

The team has lost but three games
on its home floor in 9 years.

Hamiltons average, game—44 points
Opponents average, game—23 points
Hamiltons average over a point a
minute.

Team is 100 per cent stronger this
season.

Averages 175 pounds in weight; av-
erages 5 feet 11 inches in height.
