TAX BOND NOW PREPARED

TEMPORARY ARRANGEMENT MADE WITH OFFICIALS

Pending Completion of Book Expertising Sheriff Under Bond

Simultaneously with the issuance of tax notices from the tax collecting department, Judge Henry today approved a temporary bond presented by Sheriff Childers as tax collector. The sheriff has had difficulty in securing a permanent bond, and in order to allow tax collections to proceed without delay, the temporary bond was secured, pending final completions for his permanent bond. Tax money already paid in has been held in escrow, and as soon as the temporary bond is filed today these checks will be cashed.

Bond companies are slow to accept bonds for second term collectors. However by having his books expertised frequently, by placing all his deputies under bond, and by bonding the depository he has been able to secure a permanent bond, but, however not until the present expertising is completed. When a report of the expert now at work on the county books is received by the bonding company and the other requirements have been met, Sheriff Childers will receive his permanent bond.

However, through the arrangement of the temporary bond, tax collections can go unhampered.

WITH ARRIVAL OF ONE MORE CAR MACHINERY WILL BE HERE

While there are still many heavy pieces of machinery to be placed and some few changes yet to make in the foundation, the one car of machinery now on the way to La Grande represents the residue of shipments and as soon as it is unloaded, final arrangement of all the machinery will be possible.

Delay has been occasioned by many and various changes in the foundation but the final plans have not been adopted and it will not be long before the machinery in the temporary quarters in the round house will be moved to the new shops and the machinery department of the yards transferred to the new shops and the round house devoted entirely to the round house purposes.

ARGUMENTS ARE IMPORTANT CASE POSTPONED

CALL FROM SENATE FORBIDS THEIR COMPLETION

City and Oliver Dispute not Completed Argument Last Week.

Arguments before the supreme court of Oregon over the dispute between Senator Oliver and the City of La Grande over the street division line on O and Fourth street, set for last Thursday, were commenced but not finished, according to City Attorney C. E. Cochran who returned from Salem this morning. Mr. Oliver representing his own interests, and Mr. Cochran, representing La Grande, had just gotten under way with their arguments when Mr. Oliver was called away from the court chambers and the matter has again been postponed until May when the final arguments will be heard.

Mr. Cochran happened to be in Salem Saturday night during the stormy wind up and asserts that the news dispatches do not exaggerate the warmth of the proposition in the least. The closing hours in both houses of the legislature were noisier and wilder than any in history.

Washington, Feb. 20—The supreme court this afternoon ruled against the Willamette Valley Lumber company in its freight rate case. The court decided the interstate commerce commission exceeded its jurisdiction in attempting to fix the rates on lumber shipments from the Willamette Valley in Oregon to San Francisco.
