MANY NUNS WILL COME WEST

EASTERN OREGON TO HAVE SERVICE OF WORKERS

Hospital Work to be Taken up by Company of American Nuns.

A community of English speaking nuns will reach Baker within a few weeks and begin work in various places, especially in hospital and charitable enterprises, says the Baker Herald. They come to Eastern Oregon on the invitation of Rt. Bishop O'Reilly and are specially qualified for the work in which they are engaged.

They were stationed in Portugal having gone thither to do works of charity, but on account of the unsettled conditions in that country they were forced to leave.

In the growing towns of Eastern Oregon there is a great demand for hospitals and hence these sisters are coming to carry on that work. Bishop O'Reilly expects them in a short time and has several growing towns in view in which to place them. They will be a diocesan community and will carry out the work assigned them.

Ten nuns will arrive first to take up the work but more may come later as the work enlarges and more help
