WILL FINISH HOSPITAL

Baker Has Plans for Completing Big Institution at Nearby Date

At last it seems that immediate steps are to be taken for the entire completion of the new St. Elizabeth Hospital, the foundation of which were completed some time ago, says the Baker Democrat. The Mother General of the society in Philadelphia is in Baker to confer with the local people in regard to the matter, and indications are that some definite results will be accomplished by her visit.

She states that the hospital is recognized as a crying need and that there has never been any question, but what the building would be completed by some means or other in the near future. The eastern head of the society believes that Baker is the logical place for the establishment of a hospital, which is greatly needed in this section of the state at the present time, and that such need is constantly increasing.

The Mother General has taken the matter up with the authorities here and the commercial club has appointed a committee to confer with the Baker county medical society.

The latter body has, never for a moment lost sight of the importance of action in the matter and seldom is a meeting held but what the subject comes up for discussion. In fact the members have long been formulating plans to assist in the early completion of the building in every way possible.

A joint committee of representatives of the medical profession and the commercial club will confer with the Mother General in a day or two, and it is believed that some means will at that time be formulated, that will result in arrangements being consummated for the completion of the structure.

RALLY HEADS LEAGUE

Blue Mountain League Elects Officers for Ensuing Year Yesterday.

At the gathering of the faithful fans in the Commercial association rooms last night, J. Roy Raley was elected president of the Pendleton club or the Blue Mountain league and the following men were chosen for the other positions: Henry Collins for vice president, John Dickson for secretary and Fred Lampkin for treasurer.
