BOTH TEAMS BACKED BY BIG DEL-
EGATION OF ROOTERS

High School Team Slightly Crippled
by Illness and Injury.

Greek meets Greek tonight when at 8:30 o'clock the game between the M. I. A. and the La Grande high school takes place at the school gym. Little else has been discussed during the week in athletic circles for the reason that while the city championship is at stake the prestige of the past years is also involved and each team will strive to cop the honors of the evening.

Reynolds and Bolton, the high's forwards, are slightly handicapped---the former on account of illness this week and the latter by an injured foot---but both will start the game in any event and substitutes will be ready to displace them when occasion demands it. With both teams claiming a large following the crowd should be large and it is freely admitted that the teams are closely matched.

Iceland's Primate in Office.

Dublin, Feb. 24--The Most Rev. Jno. B. Crozier was enthroned today as Archbishop of Armagh and Primate of All Ireland in succession to Dr. Alexander who recently resigned. The event was attended with much stately ceremonial. The cathedral was filled to its capacity with church dignitaries and civil, naval and military officials in full robes or uniforms. The procession which preceded the archbishop to the altar took a quarter of an hour to pass up the nave. The ceremony was concluded with the archbishop taking the customary oath and the usual promise of obedience on the part of all the clergy.

The new archbishop is 58 years old and was educated at Trinity College, Dublin. Since his ordination in 1876 his progress in the church has been unusually rapid. He became chaplain to the archbishop of Armagh in 1886 and chaplain to the Lord-Lieutenant of Ireland in 1893. For several years past he has resided at Belfast as bishop of Down and Connor.

HOUSE COLD AS CHILD DIES

NO WOOD TO WARM FAMILY DURING FATAL ILLNESS

Abject Poverty Discovered in Home in South La Grande, This Week.

One of the few cases of abject poverty existing in La Grande has been uncovered by the death of a six-months' old baby in South La Grande in the home of Mrs. Haskel, a widow. At the time of the child's death there was not enough wood in the home to kindle a fire. As soon as neighbors discovered the pathetic condition existing in the home, liberal help has been extended and yesterday, G. H. Crane solicited help for the ailing lady and her family and much assistance in the way of cash, clothing and wood was secured. The family lives on C street near the Atkinson store and is composed of the widow and four children. The oldest of the children is a boy of sixteen years who has been working at Perry at odd jobs and is the family's only means of support. Another child is 14 years and another 10, and one about 6. The six months' old baby was the youngest and was born since the husband and father died some fourteen months ago.

Erie's First Bishop Consecrated

Scranton, Pa., Feb. 24--Clergymen and laymen of the Episcopal church of this diocese and others were brilliantly represented here today at the consecration of Rev. Dr. Douglass Israel as first bishop of the recently-created diocese of Erie. The ceremony was performed in accordance with the full Episcopal ritual in St. Luke's church of which Dr. Israel has been rector for several years. Present guests of honor were Bishop Tuttle of Missouri, the presiding bishop of the church, officiating. Among the other prominent participants were Bishop Talbot of South Bethlehem, Whitehead of Pittsburgh, Lloyd of New York, Darlington of Harrisburg and Tucker of Lynchburg, Va.

The new bishop is a native of Baltimore and a graduate of Dickinson college. He was ordained to the priesthood nearly thirty years ago and has ever since been prominent in the affairs of the Episcopal church in Pennsylvania. He has been rector of St. Luke's church in Scranton for eighteen years. He is a member of the joint commission of the General Theological Seminary. METERS FOR ALL SUBSCRIBERS

FLAT RATES TO DISAPPEAR FROM WATER DEPARTMENT

Ordinance to be Introduced Tonight Setting Aside All Flat Rates.

Rearrangement of rules and regulations in the water department and installation of an entire metric system is provided for in an ordinance to be introduced at the special meeting of the council tonight. The measure will provide for a continuation of the graduated rate as used the past year but removes all regulations dealing with "flat rates" and as there remain but about 100 flat rates subscribers it will not require many days to turn the entire department over on the metric system.

The present rates running from a minimum of 5 cents to 75 cents will continue to be operative.

Various other business matters will be taken up at the council including action on the Sixth street petition, the Jefferson avenue paving and similar projects.

STIRLING PLAY COMING

"A Gentleman from Mississippi" at the Steward Friday, March 3

The attraction at the Steward on Friday, March 3 will be "A Gentleman from Mississippi," a comedy of Washington social and political life, by Harrison Rhodes and Thomas A. Wise. It is now in its third year of success and comes here under the management of Wm. A. Brady. The story of the play revolves around the advent into public life of a Mississippi planter, who had hitherto devoted more time to the development of his plantation than to the promotion of political jobs. Good fortune brings him and a clever young newspaper man, Bud Haines, together on the day of Senator Lang---don't arrival in the national capital; and Bud, accepting the post of secretary to the new senator, guides the latter through all the pitfalls of political life there without a single mishap. Langdon has two daughters whom he brings with him to Washington. The elder becomes engaged to a congressman from his native state, who induces her to place the inheritance she has received from her mother's estate in a land company which has bought considerable property in a Gulf seaport with the expectation that a bill will be passed making this place a naval base. Her brother is also induced to invest money belonging to his father and places

the money in the power of the politicians who are engineering the deal and who needs the new Senator's co-operation. Senator Langdon adroitly outwits his enemies, saves his honor and his fortune, releases his elder daughter from her engagement with the scheming congressman and suitably rewards the loyalty of Bud Haines.
