Ordinance No. 319, Series 1911

An ordinance authorizing the Mayor and Recorder to enter into a contract on behalf of the city of La Grande for the construction of a tool house and to affix the corporate name and seal of the city thereto.

The City of La Grande does ordain as follows:

Sec. 1. The Mayor and Recorder of the City of La Grande, are hereby authorized to enter into a contract with Hisner & Robinson for the construction of a tool house for the city; Heisner & Robinson to furnish all the labor and material and to construct the same according to the plans and specifications now on file with the Recorder of the City of La Grande for the sum of Three Hundred and Forty (\$340.00) Dollars, payable at the completion of said building in general fund warrants of the City of La Grande.

This ordinance shall be in full force and take effect from and after its approval by the Mayor and publication thereof in one issue of the Evening Observer.

Submitted to and approved by the Mayor on this the 25th day of February, 1911.
