

PORTLAND STOCK SHOW DRAWS

FREE ENTRANCE AND LIBERAL PRIZES ARRANGED.

First Annual Event of its Kind Ever Held West of Denver.

Portland, Or., March 3.—(Special.)—The fat stock show at the Union Stockyards in North Portland March 20, 21 and 22 will be the first annual exhibition of its kind held west of Denver. It will be purely educational, there being no admission fee, and the plan is to promote the interests in livestock. Cattle, horse, sheep and hogs will be shown.

James J. Hill of the Great Northern, and Judge Robert S. Lovett of the Harbison lines, have lent their support to the show and the two railroad systems will co-operate in every way to make it a success. Dur-

ing the show there will be a sale of thoroughbred beef cattle and a great display of draft horses will be one of the leading features. A special rate of one and one-third fares has been granted by the railroads from Washington, Oregon, Idaho and also from Northern California.

Although it costs nothing to enter stock, prizes will be liberal, some amounting to \$150 each. These are offered for: cattle, grade and cross-bred single sters, swine, sheep wethers and draft horses, and there will also be a killing contest.

There will be a students' judging contest on the afternoon of the first day, followed by lectures on livestock topics. On March 21 will be judging of carload lots of cattle, judging of steers, judging of hogs, judging hogs in pens of five, judging sheep in carloads, judging sheep in pens of five, judging wethers, single animals.

On the morning of March 22 there will be a sale of fat cattle and the awards in the killing contest, following by judging draft horses in harness. In the afternoon there will be a sale of registered cattle.
