GIRLS WIN ALL THEIR GAMES

TAKE CONTEST FROM UNION HIGH WITH EASE.

Undeclared, the Girls Stand as Champions of Eastern Oregon.

Cinching their claims to the championship of eastern Oregon and finishing the year undefeated, the girls' team of the high school last Saturday evening decisively defeated the Union five in an exciting game, final score 19 to 9. From the first whistle to the last play the La Grande girls had the better of the argument. Miss Topp's superior work at center, where she easily outclassed her opponent, kept the ball in home territory much of the time, and Miss Love and Miss Massee were accurate enough in their basket shooting to score repeated goals from the field. Many fans took advantage of the game to see what is likely the last contest of the year and rooting, lead by alumni of the school, was especially heated.

Miss Ruth Cotner, suffering from an injury received early in the year, was removed early in the last half after playing an exceptionally brilliant game at guard and Miss Hilda Anthony, a new face in basketballdom took her place with credit. Miss Bacon wound up the season with playing the most effective game of the year, while Miss Topp's work was exceptionally good. The team work between the forwards was, as usual, a feature of the game and the two have combinations well in hand and few guards in this section of the state can prevent them from throwing baskets. Several fouls were called on the Union girls for violations of the "guarding over" clause, a manifest foul but nevertheless not one that particularly mars the swiftness of the games or displays a willful desire to foul.
