Interesting Timber Statistics.

Spokane, Wash., March 7.—Statistics compiled by A. W. Cooper, secretary of the Western Pine Manufacturers' association, show there is an available supply of standing timber in the Inland Empire to construct 17,000,000 four and five-room cottages, or sufficient to house more than half of the population of the United States and Canada. Four hundred mills in the district, having a total capacity of 3,000,000,000 feet, cut 1,463,000,000 feet or 60,000 cars of lumber in 1910 as against 1,250,000,000 feet in 1909. The value of the product at the mill is estimated at \$21,000,000, of which amount \$14,000,000 was paid for labor. Six million dollars was paid to railroads for hauling the output. The value of the stumpage cut is placed at \$3,000,000. The report shows there is about \$110,000,000 invested in the industry in this district, and that the working capital employed ranges from \$25,000,000 to \$30,000,000. One hundred thousand persons are directly supported by the industry and 20,000 men are employed on a basis of 200 days a year.

Spokane Tries New Plan.

Spokane, Wash., March 7.—Spokane is holding its first election today under the new charter recently adopted by popular vote. The new charter is modeled rather closely after that recently adopted in Grand Junction, Col., though in its main features it follows the general plan of commission government in force in many cities in the west and south. The present mayor and city council will be supplanted by a board of five commissioners. There are nearly a hundred candidates for the commissionerships, among them being the present mayor and a number of the other city officials.

ILLINOIS SUFFRAGETTES ACTIVE.

Big Crown Will Address the Legislature on Woman's Rights Today.

Chicago, March 7.—Five hundred suffragettes start for Springfield today to demonstrate the legislature in favor of woman's rights. The votes for women flag is flying from the state house and 25 women will address the woman's legislature tonight and later be tendered a reception to be given them by Mrs. Deneen, wife of the governor.

To Choose New Bishop.

Kansas City, Mo., March 7.—Representatives of the clergy and laity of the Protestant Episcopal diocese of Kansas City met in special convention in St. Paul's church here today to choose a successor to the late Right Rev. E. R. Atwill, bishop of Kansas City. The deliberations of the convention were conducted behind closed doors. There was nothing to indicate who the successful candidate might be, although there is said to be a strong sentiment in favor of Right Rev. Cameron Mann, missionary bishop of North Dakota, who formerly was rector of Grace Church in this city.

Farmer Grain Dealers.

Springfield, Ill., March 7.—Representative dealers of the leading cooperative organizations of the country head the list of speakers at the eighth annual convention of the Farmers' Grain Dealers' Association of Illinois, which began a three days' session here today. Among them are C. S. Barrett, of Georgia, president of the Farmers' Educational and Co-Operative Union of America; E. M. Tousey, of Minneapolis, president of the Right Relationship League; C. O. Dryden, of North Carolina, president of the American Society of Equity, and E. G. Dunn, of Mason City, Iowa, secretary of the Farmers' Grain Dealers' Association of Iowa.
