"SPANKER JACK" AT SPOKANE

BOYS ARE SPANKED BY SECOND PROFESSIONAL SPANKER.

Young Girls Enticed to Lonely Hut Near Spokane by Strange Man.

Spokane, March 14.—Another "Jack the spanker," is at large in this vicinity. With Charles Brown, an alleged assailant of seven small boys already in jail, another man is terrorizing the residence districts, whipping small boys and attempting to entice small girls to a hut on Hangman's creek. The police report no success at catching the man in the act.

SNARE RIVER BRIDGE ASSURED.

Like Makes Provisions for Passage of Appropriation for that Purpose.

The Snake river bridge at Brownlee is assured. The Idaho legislature has appropriated \$10,000, which with the like amount appropriated by the Oregon legislature will cover the estimated cost of the structure, says the Baker Democrat.

The Oregon bill which was introduced simultaneously in the senate and house by Senator McCulloch and Representative McKinney, was passed and the money will, according to the laws of Oregon, become available 90 days after the legislature adjourns, which will be May 15th. The appropriation in each state was contingent on the action of the other, and the Baker delegation has co-operated throughout the members of the legislative body in Washington county, Idaho, with the result that the Idaho body has voted in favor of the appropriation.

The money appropriated by the Oregon body will be turned over to County Judge Basche, who will confer with the county judge of Washington county, in regard to the details of the construction of the bridge as soon as the funds become available, which will be in the near future.

The action of the Idaho legislature is favorable news to the residents of both states in the vicinity of Brownlee where the bridge is to be built, as it means that a long felt want will be filled, that will be of great benefit to the community and county at large.

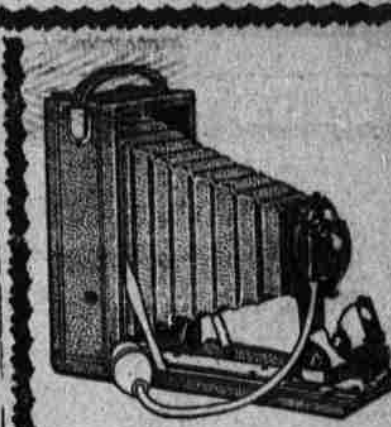
